WINNIPEG, July 22 — (CP) — Oats and barley prices moved narrowly in dull trade Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. Some selling in both grains was prompted by overnight rains in Manitoba. A few shipping orders came out, but prices generally were lower. July rye continued to advance under buying attributed to American interests which found little for sale. Seaboard buying appeared in flux dealings. No information was available on export loadings of Canadian wheat. Prices for I.W.A. and class two wheat were unchanged from yesterday. Strikes Account For Lost Time

OTTAWA, July 21 — (CP) — Three strikes accounted for more than 71 per cent of the total time lost and affected more than 50 per cent of the workers involved in work stoppages arising from disputes in Canada during June, the Labor Department announced Friday. Strikes of rubber factory workers at Toronto were responsible for a combined time loss of 92,000 man-working days and involved a combined total of 6,950 workers. Preliminary figures showed 52 strikes and lockouts during the month, involving 13,641 workers with a time loss of 128,150 man-working days.
