Most of the moderate offerings were in oats. Domestic shippers made purchases in oats during the dull pre-holiday session. Barley attracted orders from processors and exporters. The same sources picked up flax. Rye dealings were mostly local.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat during the last few days included: United Kingdom 800,000 bushels; Belgium 800,000; Brazil 25,000; India 330,000; Saudi Arabia 20,000; and Switzerland a small parcel.

Prices for ton grades of IWA and class two wheat were down quarter cent from yesterday.

Says Robbery Takes Little Courage

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30 - (AP) - "Robbing a bank takes no more courage than going into a store and buying a loaf of bread." That's the opinion expressed today by grandma the bank bandit, Mrs. Ethel Arata, 52, who has admitted a brief crime career including two bank stickups.

She told officers during a fingerprint session that her greatest regret was that she "ruined Christmas for the Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and police" who were kept away from their families when she was arrested during an attempted holdup on Christmas eve.

Earlier it was disclosed the grandmotherly type woman who says she really isn't a grandma was the daughter of a former New York multimillionaire.

Her uncle, Benjamin S. Catts, 70, a Hollywood real estate broker, has corroborated her story that her father lost millions in the 1929 crash. Catts said she is obviously ill and he will instruct his lawyer to help her.

Fourth Witness In Brinks Case Jailed

BOSTON, Dec. 30 - (AP) - A fourth reluctant witness was sentenced to jail Monday for refusing to answer questions before a federal grand jury investigating the \$1,219,000 Brink's robbery.

Paul Hooley, 39, of Boston, was ordered to begin serving a nine-month term on Jan. 5. Hooley's wife, Mary, 37, has appealed a term of a year in jail for her refusal to tell the grand jury if she had ever seen \$70,000 at one time.

Mrs. Hooley is a sister of Joseph J. (Specs) O'Keefe, a 44-year-old Boston gunman identified by the Federal Bureau of Investigation as the chief suspect in the fabulous robbery of the money express company Jan. 17, 1950.
