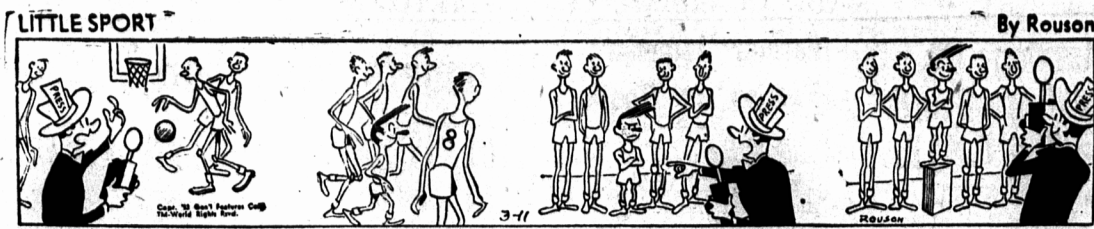

Billy Martin Concentrating On Hitting This Season

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Billy Martin, disputed middleweight boxing champion of the American League last year, is going to devote his pugilistic prowess to punching out base hits in 1953.

The jaunty, self-assured and combative New York Yankee second baseman has a burning ambition to become a .300 hitter.

"There is no reason why I shouldn't hit .300 this year," the little Californian said Tuesday. "I know I batted only .267 last year but I played under a severe handicap. I broke my ankle sliding for that spaghetti film Joe DiMaggio's television program after 10 days of training last spring and I never got right again after Jerry Coleman left and I went to second base. I'm a natural .285-290 hitter. The difference between .280 and .300 is only about eight hits."

When manager Casey Stengel was told about the ambition of his brash sophomore infielder, who is one of his old Pacific Coast League favorites, he laughed heartily, then shook his head in agreement.

"I bet that little beggar does it, too," Casey said. "There isn't a player in the league with more spunk or desire. People ask me who won the championship for us last year and I say that little beggar and I'm not far off base. And I'm not only referring to the great catch he made in the final game of the World Series or the game-winning hit he got in the pennant clincher, either."

"Nobody knows that little beggar never got over that broken ankle. He didn't tell me a thing but he kept trying to keep from limping on that ankle all year and he gave the knee a twist when he tried to knock the ball out of that big Eddie Robbinson fellow in Chicago."

"For three weeks he had his knee all bandaged up and could hardly walk, but he warned our trainer Gus Mauch he'd kill him if he told me about it. Yes, sir, if that rooster says he will hit .300, he'll hit it."
