HOME-MADE CARPORT QUESTION: I would like to make a weatherproof shelter for our second car, a compact, located on the side of our garage.

ANSWER: For just this purpose, you can easily get away with much less work and materials.

LIGHTNING BRONZE QUESTION: Is there any way to lighten a bronze statuette? After a few years of standing on my trophy shelf, it seems quite a bit darker than when it was presented.

ANSWER: Rub it with dry cottonseed or powdered white. Do this outdoors, if possible, to avoid scattering this powder where it's not wanted.

QUESTION: I bought a throw rug for my apartment floor. It's a hardwood floor, well varnished, so I made sure the rug has a non-skid rubberized backing. But it seems to

have stuck. When I lifted it, it left a sort of sticky fuzz which I can't clean off. What can I use?

Organization Has Appeal

The Canadian Friends Service Committee, a Quaker service organization announced yesterday its intention to participate in a wider medical aid programme to supply needy peoples of the world.

They are appealing for antibiotics and anti-malarial drugs, which will be sent to South Vietnam, North Vietnam (Hanoi) and National Liberation Front areas of that country.

The Canadian Quaker organization will make its first shipment to Vietnam in September. The relief will be sent through American Friends Service Committee workers and to the Red Cross via the "Alexandri Pushkin" — the U.S.S.R. liner.

The aid will be distributed through Quakers in South Vietnam and through Red Cross channels in both North Vietnam and the National Liberation Front territories.

Island Cow Still In 90's

A purebred Holstein cow owned by Lewis and Albert Cormier of Richmond, P.E.I., has milked 112 lbs a day on twice-a-day milking. This cow freshened May 15th and for the first two months on R.O.P. test milked 100 lbs a day. In her third month she is still in the 90's.

This cow is one of four daughters of Crown Point Model Band leader secured by Cormier Bros. from Cyril Jones of Alexandria, P.E.I. last March.

Cyril has, at home, a three-year-old daughter of the 112 lb cow who is classified "Very Good" in Selective Registration and has produced 80 lbs of 4.6 per cent milk the day the R.O.P. Inspector called.

Cormier Bros. bought eight head altogether from Cyril Jones two of them being daughters of the "Class Extra" sire, Rosafe Shamrock Perseus, one a daughter of the very good sire, Crown Point Senator Abegweit and the other a daughter of Crown Point Lamplighter.

Lamplighter is a son of the "Excellent" cow, Crown Point Jill and is now in service in the New Brunswick A.I. Centre.

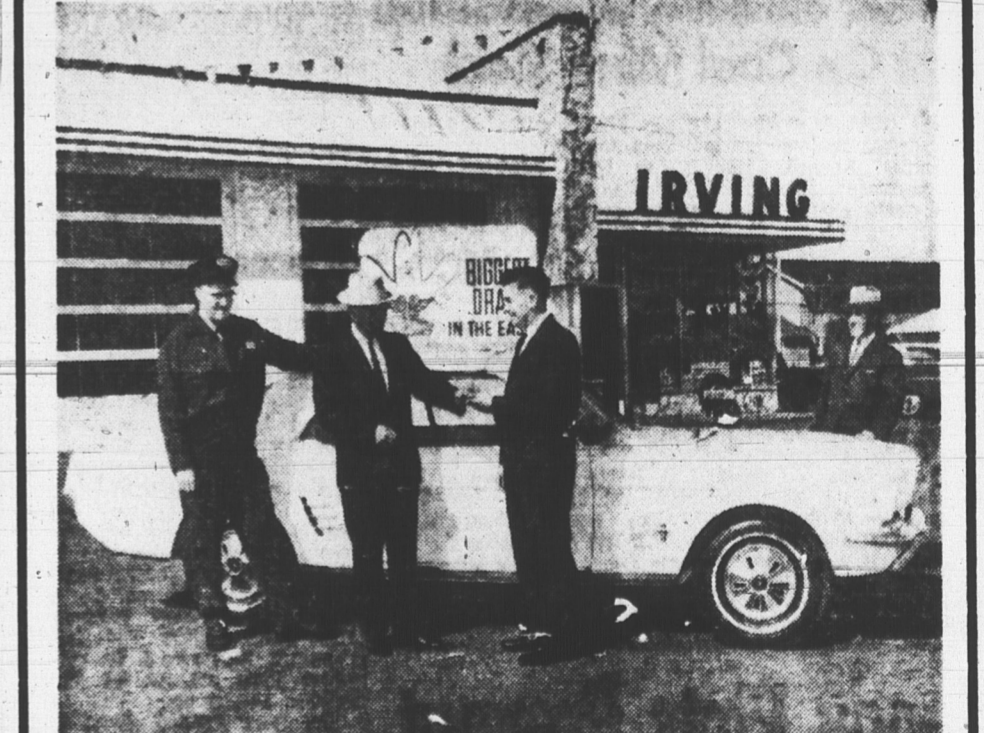
