

Close Battles At The Track Saturday Night

A ten-dash racing card staged at the Exhibition track, once again provided a large crowd of racing fans with a top-notch display of keen, close track battles here on Saturday night.

With the exception of a strong wind that was against fast times, the events were otherwise favored with ideal conditions and provided classic racing entertainment on a card that was not without its excitement and upsets.

Coming up to nip leading favorites at the wire, Willard Kelly's Nell Kalmuck and Sam Kennedy's Col. Looker provided two of the biggest upsets in all the one class. Doing the reinsmen duties with their own horses, Kelly guided Nell to a driving win in the number three dash over Filbert, Babe Britton, Lock Hanover, Mannister Direct and Col. Looker, to pay off win bettors \$25.80, while Kennedy turned the tables on the same field in the seventh dash when he brought Col. Looker home in front for a \$27.70 pari-mutuel payoff.

J.S.J.'s unexpected victory over a strong eight-horse field in the sixth event supplied the other major upset of the night to pay-off \$19.50 to winning ticket holders. It was another case of the owner piloting his own horse to victory, Horace B. Willis doing the honors with his J.S.J.

It took Lorne Letcher's Spring Hill, N. S., entry, Jenny Kalmuck to provide the only big double victory of the night. Driven by Henry O'Donnell, Jenny came through ahead of four other entries to win both the fifth and ninth dashes.

Nell Kalmuck came up with the fastest time of the night when she trotted off the mile in 2:12

4-5 in winning the number three event.

Other winners were Alan Mac in the first dash of the night, Abner The Great in the number two dash, Lusticia in the fourth, Mildale in the eighth and Billy McVey in the final dash on the card.

Leo Lamoureux will make his first public appearance of the season here at the Forum tomorrow night, but it won't be in his usual role of manager and coach of the Islanders hockey team, Maritime Big Four Hockey League champions. It will be a rougher and tougher assignment than that: although admittedly Leo had some tough ones to handle during last year's hockey season, when fans see him step into the wrestling ring to help officiate at the big "Tag Match" to be staged there that will bring together the team of Len Hughes and Sal Balbo against the two wild bulls of the mat game, Montana and Currie.

Just how Leo "The Lion" will fare out in the same ring with the "Bulls" is anybody's guess, but it should make the event interesting. Neither Currie or Montana show any great respect for the referee at the best of times, and when the forthcoming meeting amounts to practically a "rude" affair with the four matmen, two referees in there with them is sure going to make things complicated to say the least. There will be plenty of action, that is for sure.

Harry "Kid" Poulton of Charlottetown, will get a chance to regain his Maritime welterweight boxing title here in the very near future. It was learned last night from promoter Bill Brown, manager of the Forum, Bill stated last night that he has just signed Tommy (Gun) Spencer to meet Poulton at the Forum in a title scrap within the next week or two.

Defending his title against all comers for the last several months, Poulton fell prey to the shifty New Waterford boxer in a title bout at New Glasgow on July 15th, and has been looking for a return match ever since. Captains Team To Victory At Bisley; Toronto Shot Wins King's Prize



BISLEY, Surrey, England, July 22—(CP)—A young Canadian civil engineer Saturday won the King's Prize, most coveted individual award of the annual Commonwealth rifle competition.

Lieut. Gilmour Boa, 26, of the 48th Highlanders, Toronto, blazed his way to victory in the Empire's outstanding test of marksmanship. He shot 285 out of a possible 300 to win the £250 given by the King and the National Rifle Association gold medal and badge.

Nine other marksmen of Canada's team of 18 shooting members in the N.R.A. competition placed among the "King's hundred", winning an Empire-wide badge of distinction with the service rifle.

An eight-man Canadian team, captained by Miss Mary MacLennan, Alexandria, P.E.I. school teacher, (above), won the Rajah of Kolapore Imperial Challenge Cup—a competition for teams drawn from all parts of the Commonwealth. She is the first Canadian woman to compete in the Empire shooting match.

First to greet him with a kiss was Miss MacLennan. Before a startled array of judges, she flung her arms around his neck, shouting "Good old Gill, the Maple Leaf for ever."

Boa, who told a reporter afterwards "it feels wonderful to have won the prize," expressed only one wish, to have his father, Lieut. James Boa, present.

The young marksman was wearing the jacket his father had worn when he won the Governor-General's Prize in 1948. The rifle he used was one with which his father has been winning major competitions for the last 20 years.

Canada's Place
Nine Canadians placed among the first 100 in competition for the Grand Aggregate for service-rifle events. B. Wardle of the City of London Rifle Club, winner of the competition, wins the 74-year-old Dominion of Canada Challenge Trophy and the N.R.A. gold cross. He had 566 out of a possible 605.

The King's Prize is the most exacting test of marksmanship of all the varied competitions of the annual Bisley meet. Boa became the seventh Canadian to capture the award. A Canadian last won it in 1929 when Lt.-Col. R. M. Blair of the Seaforth Highlanders, Vancouver, won with an aggregate of 283.

The competition is shot in three stages with competitors firing 10 shots at each of the 200, 500 and 600-yard distances in the first stage. The 300 best scorers enter the second stage where competition is similar.

Only the 100 top marksmen qualify for the final stage, firing 15 shots at each of the 900 and 1,000-yard ranges.

Boa's closest competitors, J. E. Ridden and D. F. Cantley of the London Rifle Club, trailed him by three points.

With everything depending on it, the young civil engineer—to whom rifle shooting is "more a religion than a sport"—raised his rifle for the last shot.

He lowered it again, took a deep breath, sighed and the bullet socked home.
