Ferry Service Gets Attention

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Opposition leader—elect James J. Greene said Wednesday a proposed car ferry service between North Sydney, N.S., and eastern Newfoundland was receiving "lots of attention" from the federal treasury board.

Mr. Greene said the ferry, which would likely operate into Argentina, Nfld., was being studied by the board and "the matter is definitely alive."

Mr. Greene, Newfoundland Progressive Conservative leader, had just returned from Ottawa.

Present ferry service, operated by the CNR, runs between North Sydney and Port aux Basques on the west coast.

Press Is Barred From Assembly

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados (Reuters)—Reporters of the Advocate the only daily newspaper on this West Indian island, Wednesday were refused entry to the House of Assembly by order of the Speaker, Kenmore Husbands.

Last week the Speaker ordered the reporters out of the House, as he had threatened to do if he did not receive an apology from the editor, Ian Gale, for remarks on a debate published earlier.

A reporter had claimed that he was unable to hear the Speaker's remarks because the amplifying equipment was not working, the Speaker was speaking softly and other members were laughing.

No reports of the House are being published in the Advocate and, since the official record of proceedings is a year behind, the public is in the dark about the debate on proposals for changes in the constitution.

Hunting Accident Story Is Related

SOMBRA, Ont. (CP)—Harlow Currie, 66, former president of General Motors, related Wednesday how he accidentally shot and killed his old friend Harry Anderson in a duck hunting blind on St. Anne's Island near Wallaceburg.

He told the five-man coroner's jury hearing evidence at the opening day of an inquest that "I have been the victim of this tragic experience."

Mr. Anderson, 67, former vice-president of GM, died following a shotgun blast in the head while duck hunting Nov. 18 with Mr. Currie.

Mr. Currie, recounting details of the incident, said he and Mr. Anderson were together sitting on wooden ammunition boxes in the blind.

"We were shooting from a sitting position," Mr. Currie related. "Anderson occasionally rose to fire. We had fired eight or 10 times each before it happened."

Although they had made no arrangement about firing alternately, they had agreed to shoot in different directions. Ducks were coming in from both south and east.

"At the time I squeezed the trigger, I guess he must have stood up and got in the line of fire," Mr. Currie said. "It was a tremendous shock to me."

He said he did not know his friend was shot until he saw him fall.

Asked by Mr. Silk if he could suggest any recommendations for prevention of such accidents in the future, Mr. Currie suggested only one gun in any particular blind.

Contract Bridge

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been: North East South West 1♥ 2♦ ?

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A863 ♥84 ♦9732 ♣AK10
 2. ♠A942 ♥8752 ♦853 ♣K974
 3. ♠A942 ♥Q9 ♦964 ♣A753
 4. ♠AKJ74 ♥J83 ♦82 ♣785

1. Double. The best results are sometimes obtained by doubling a low part score contract. Most opening bids contain at least three defensive tricks, and we should therefore assume that our three tricks, added to partner's three or more, will prevent East from making eight tricks.

No other satisfactory bid is available. Hearts cannot be raised; notrump cannot be bid without a diamond stopper; and the spades are too anemic to be mentioned. If North has a normal opening bid and accepts the double, the contract will probably be defeated by one to three tricks.

2. Pass. The general rule is that when partner opens with one of a suit, a response of some sort must be made with a holding of 6 or more points. Distributional factors may be considered in choosing whether to respond.

But the obligation to bid with a relatively poor hand lapses when an opponent overcalls the opening bid. It is no longer necessary to keep the bidding going because the opponent has done so and partner has another bid coming. Hence, a voluntary bid—made after an opponent overcalls—shows sound values, and is almost never based on just a 6-point hand. The free raise of partner's suit will usually have 8 to 10 points, distributional or otherwise.

3. Two hearts. This is the rare case where partner can be raised with only two trumps. The bid is defective for this reason, but it is made because all other possible bids would be even more defective. The absence of an additional trump is compensated for by the presence of 10 high-card points.

The two heart bid has the merit of keeping the contract at a low level if partner has only a minimum opening bid. But a forcing bid of two spades or three clubs would push the bidding skyward with no clear objective in view.

4. Two hearts. Despite the temptation to bid two spades, which would compel partner to bid again, only the non-forcing raise to two hearts is given. If partner passes the free bid, game chances are very poor. It takes the equivalent of two opening bids to make a game. If partner cannot move over two hearts, it will mean he does not have enough extra values to produce a game in spades, hearts, or elsewhere.
