Rich Woman Dies From Over-Dieting

DETROIT, Sept. 23—(AP)—One of the United States' richest women, intent on preserving her Parisian beauty, died Saturday night of what her doctors described as the effects of over-dieting.

Mrs. Marian Peck Miles, 44, blonde heiress to a Canadian canvas fortune, died at her 31-room Georgian mansion in suburban Grosse Pointe Farms. She had spent 58 days in an oxygen tent. Her body will be taken to the family home at Wood-Vue near Ottawa.

Her doctors, who insisted on remaining anonymous, said she had been suffering from purpuric anaemia. They said the ailment was caused by her insistence on trimming down her weight despite their warnings.

Mrs. Miles, listed on numerous social registers, inherited an estimated 100,000,000 from her father, the late Francis G. Peck. She, who died on the Island of Capri in 1925, was a merchant, banker, financier and philanthropist with extensive holdings in Canada and the United States and in foreign industries.

Steel Wage Talks Enter Decisive Stage

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 23—(CP)—Steel workers hurled charges of "blatant contempt" and "sabotage" at Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation tonight as a long wage dispute entered what may be the decisive week.

Men from the No. 1 open hearth shop, currently under suspension for a sitdown strike, were addressed by their union leader, who outlined the course of earlier wage talks.

Ed Corbett, president of the 4,700-man Sydney local of United Steel Workers of America (C.I.O.-C.C.L.) re-iterated in a statement following the meeting that the union will continue to battle for higher wages despite a "fear" campaign by Doxco.

Clem Anson, Doxco steel operations chief, charged the union with irresponsibility and failure to live up to its contract, which expires March 31.

Mother Drives Herself, Children To Death In Lake

TORONTO, Sept. 23—(CP)—A 40-year-old mother drove an automobile into Lake Ontario today, carrying herself and her three children to death.

Drowned were Mrs. Eleanor Stuart, wife of Joseph T. Stuart, and their three children: Ethel, 9, Susan, 8, and Joseph, seven months.

Witnesses said they saw the car move slowly along the lake front in Toronto's east end, turn toward the water and nose in. The witnesses said they saw persons in the car scrambling from the front seat to the back but none of the car doors opened as the auto disappeared into the lake within three minutes.

"The car just drove over the water's edge," said Harry Hogg. There seemed to be no attempt to stop.

Neighbors said Mrs. Stuart had not seemed herself since the birth of the baby seven months ago.

Horace Davey, ex-Ottawa now of Kenmore N.Y., tore down banners being carried by the demonstrators and shouldered them roughly with all his 185 pounds. Apparently deciding they could not hit back at the man of free cloth, the marchers almost immediately walked away.

N. B. Airwoman To Accompany Royal Tour

OTTAWA, Sept. 23—(CP)—The R.C.A.F. announced tonight that one of its stenographers, pretty Robert (Bobbie) Richards of Edmundston, N.B., has been elected to accompany the royal tour next month.

A leading airwoman in the R.C.A.F., the east-coast brunette, whose age is defined only as "in her mid-20s," will be taking dictation from Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

She'll have a compartment aboard the royal train on its trip across the country, and an extra supply of service clothing to help her look neat on the long journey. Greece And Turkey To Join NATO

OTTAWA, Sept. 23—The North Atlantic Treaty Organization, with a blast at Russia's "empty" peace offers and with plans for bringing Greece and Turkey into the anti-Communist coalition, Thursday concluded a five-day secret meeting here.

The 12-member organization entered a new phase in its two-year career with many problems ahead and with Canada's External Affairs Minister Pearson at the helm. He took over from Foreign Minister Van Zeeland of Belgium as president at the end of the council meetings and will hold the post for a year.

The decision to recommend admission of Greece and Turkey to N.A.T.O. was described by State Secretary Acheson of the United States as the "big, concrete, immediate achievement" in Ottawa.

He told a press conference it was not easy for some members to support a U.S. proposal that N.A.T.O. be extended to the Near East, but in the end the decision was unanimous. Earlier, Norway and particularly Denmark had pressed for a Mediterranean pact that would include Greece and Turkey.

The two countries cannot be invited to join N.A.T.O. until most parliaments have ratified the council's recommendation. However, it is understood that the United States, Britain and France have already substantially agreed on a separate N.A.T.O. command for the Near East.

New Commands

Greece would be under Gen. Eisenhower's European command, but a new command would be built around Turkey. This command would possibly work out close military arrangements with other eastern countries.

The reference to the Russian peace offers was contained in a statement, declaring the council's decision to expand its cooperation in such non-military fields as economics, finance, foreign policy and even culture.

The statement recalled that the Atlantic Pact Organization was formed to preserve peace. Then, without mentioning Russia by name, the statement said: "A series of so-called peace offers as vague in language as they are obscure in content are made from time to time. The peoples of the North Atlantic community will test these offers by the deeds that follow them. They will never re-

HALIFAX, Sept. 21—(CP)—A weary carrier pigeon, its leg band marked "Holland, 1950" arrived here today aboard the tanker Imperial Welland, on which it took refuge yesterday.

Capt. John W. Hefford said the pigeon landed on the ship's deck several times before it abandoned attempts to fly away. It was picked up about half way between Cape Race, Nfld., and Nova Scotia.

A five-man committee was established to submit definite recommendations on how the pact nations might develop a real Atlantic community through removal of restrictions on trade, through co-operation on foreign policies and through closer economic, financial and social co-operation.

Gen. Eisenhower will be invited to attend the Rome meeting, called especially to deal with military matters including the integration of Germany into the Western European defence establishment.

Prior to the meeting a high-level committee, including representatives of each of the 12 members, will make a survey of Gen. Eisenhower's defence needs over the next few years and the economic capabilities of the pact nations.

Agreement was reached on sharing the costs of European airfields, communications and barracks for the integrated forces in Europe. Canada's initial contribution will be about \$10,000,000. Unanimity also was reached on a request that the council meet three or four times a year instead of once.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23—(CP)—Bannerman M. Lockhart of Coleman, P.E.I., was arraigned on a manslaughter charge in County court here Friday in connection with the death of Pearl Lockhart in a highway accident at nearby Armadale Sept. 8.

No plea was taken and the case was continued for one week with bail set at \$10,000. Lockhart's leg was encased in a plaster cast when he appeared before Magistrate R.J. Flinn and was not represented by Counsel.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 24. The government of New Brunswick put into effect the Old Age Assistance Act so that eligible persons in the 65 to 69 age group may qualify for old age pensions up to a maximum of \$40 a month. The plan will be in operation by Jan. 1, 1952, it was announced here by Premier McNair.

The money required to pay the cost of the pensions each month will be furnished equally by the federal and New Brunswick governments. In addition, the province also will pay the cost and be responsible for the administration of the scheme, the premier said.

All persons in the 65 to 69 age group seeking old age pensions will be subject to the eligibility test. Residence in Canada will be a primary condition. Applicants for the old age assistance must not be in receipt of any allowance under the Blind Persons Act or War Veterans Allowance Act of 1946, it was pointed out.
