GAME PROTECTION.—Some enquiries have been made about the game close seasons, and to those interested the following is of value: "None of the birds or animals hereinafter mentioned shall be taken or killed, or attempted to be taken or killed, within the periods hereinafter mentioned. Partridge, between the 1st day of December and the 1st day of Oct. 2. Woodcock and snipe between the 1st day of January and the 10th day of Aug. 3. Waterfowl, which are known as wild duck, between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September. 4. Hares or rabbits between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September. 5. Muskrat, marten or otter between the 1st day of May and the 1st day of November." By an Act of the Legislature passed in 1898, the killing of partridge was prohibited for two years, but on the 1st of October partridge shooting recommenced, to continue till the last of November, as by above.

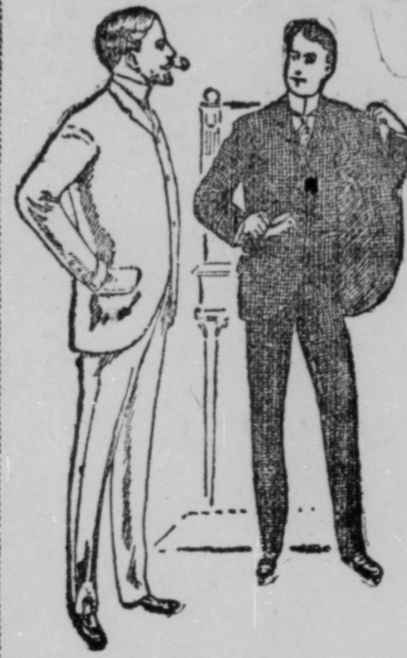
