Lamoureux Plays As Team Dresses 11 Men; Gray, Bellringer Score

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 23 — (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders held Saint John Beavers to a 2-2 draw tonight as Beavers maintained their 11-point lead over the second place Island squad in the Maritime Major Hockey League. The game was seen by 1,972 paying fans, an improvement over recent crowds at the forum.

All the goals were scored within the first 12 minutes of play. Bill McCracken shot both for Saint John before Don Bellringer and Bob Gray tallied.

It is the Athletics' first venture in the top classification minor league since they operated the Portland, Ore., team in the Pacific Coast League from 1924 to 1934.

The move leaves the Giants without an International League farm representative for the first time since 1936 when they bought the Albany, N.Y., franchise and
