Dale Carnegie, Author and Lecturer Dies At 66

NEW YORK (AP)—Dale Carnegie, 66, a once spry youth who rose to wealth and fame as a speech teacher and author of "How to Win Friends and Influence People," died Tuesday.

He had been ill for a month but friends had not considered his condition critical. They said his illness started as a case of shingles, an inflammatory skin disease, and that complications developed.

The author and lecturer headed the Carnegie Institute of Effective Speech in Hummer Relations, which conducts courses in communications. A half-million persons have taken the courses.

His widow, Mrs. Dorothy Price Vanderpool Carnegie, said the illness will be continued under her direction and that plans her husband had made to expand the courses will be carried out.

Carnegie's book, "How to Win Friends and Influence People," published in 1936, had a sale of about 1,000,000 copies. Another of the various books he wrote was "How to Stop Worrying and Start Living."

"The greatest tragedy about human nature," he once said, "is that we put off real living. Life we learn too late, in the living of it."

Carnegie was born Nov. 24, 1888, on a farm near Maxwell, Mo. Later the family moved to another farm near Warrensburg, Mo., where he attended state teachers college.

FELT INFERIOR.
The family was so poor Carnegie was unable to pay the \$1-a-day for room and board. He lived at home. He said later that his poverty and shabby clothes gave him an inferiority complex in school, prompting him to find some way to distinguish himself.

He was not strong enough to shine in sports, so turned his attention to the debating team. He overcame his feeling of inferiority and became one of its star speakers.

After holding several jobs, he came to New York with \$500 savings to become an actor. He appeared in one road show. Then he tried selling automobiles, without much success.

He remembered his best success as a debater, and decided to teach public speaking. He offered to do so for \$2 a night at a YMCA. The "Y" doubted the course would prove popular but agreed that he try on a commission basis. Within two years he was making \$30 a night instead of the \$2 he asked.

Soon the classes became too large for him to handle himself. That was the beginning of his institute. He trained instructors to give the courses, not only in speaking but in salesmanship, human relationship and applied psychology.

Stresses Need Of More Temperance Education

A request that a director of temperance education be appointed for the schools of the Province, was made at a resolution passed at the annual meeting of the P. E. I. Temperance Federation yesterday. Other resolutions urged pastors and churches to hold a decision day for the enlisting of people for the total abstinence cause, to contact Sunday Schools with the view of gaining wider use of temperance lessons; and to urge congregations to take a stand against the practice of social drinking. A pledge of support was made to Dr. Ross and Mrs. Eaton, Sackville.

During the evening session the election of officers of the organization for the coming year was conducted. Mr. Colin Waugh was re-elected President, other officers re-elected were: Donald I. McClure, East Baltic, Secretary; Mr. Robert Carruthers, Kensington, Treasurer.

The meetings were held in Zion Church Hall. The delegates were welcomed on behalf of the church by Elder Reginald MacNutt. Rev. John Linton, General Secretary of the Canadian Federation, Toronto, who was chief speaker at the evening meeting.

During the afternoon session Dr. Ross C. Eaton, Field Secretary, pointed out that a large number of those who drink are reluctant drinkers who more or less are under compulsion of social custom.

Dr. Eaton led a discussion on the drinking problem among teenagers. In this connection a film "Alcohol is Dynamite" was shown. The film is being made available to any group who wishes to use it.

Inattention Cause Of Many Local Accidents

Motor Vehicle Highway accidents in the Province between the months of July-September, inclusive, resulted in estimated damages of \$87,477 according to the quarterly report of the Prince Edward Island Motor Vehicle Branch, issued yesterday.

Of a total of 240 accidents there were four fatal, 59 non-fatal and 177 resulting in property damages only. Two drivers, five passengers and one pedestrian made up the three months' period. Sixty-three persons received injuries from the 59 non-fatal accidents.

In making some observations, it was noted that the greatest contributory cause is once more "inattention" caused by such practices, as driving in the centre of the road; backing out of garage without first seeing that the road was clear and generally not watching the driving of the vehicle.

Speeds, too fast for road conditions resulted in about 10 per cent of the accidents while "driving while intoxicated" added another 10 per cent to the toll. The Motor Vehicle Branch makes the suggestion to the motoring public that extreme alertness should be exercised from now on. They point out that wet leaves, unfavorable weather conditions, road conditions and early darkness all tend to increase the hazard of driving or walking on the highway or streets.

Was Native Of This Province Staff Changes At Local Bank

TORONTO (CP)—Mervyn A. Brown, 71, a Canadian who organized the Statesmanship Foundation, a political school in the United States, died recently in Washington, it was learned here Monday. Born in York P.E.I. he moved to Medicine Hat Alta., where he served as Mayor from 1914 to 1917 and in 1919 and 1920.

Mr. Brown lived for 14 years in London, Eng., and Toronto before moving to Washington.

He is survived by his wife, Katharine.

Mr. Brown was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Brown sister predeceased him. They were Herbert, George, David, Edwin and Hattie. (Mrs. Warren Vessey).

East German Red Party Boss Admits Failures

BERLIN (Reuters)—East German Communist party chief Walter Ulbricht has admitted "a series of failures in party work," in a speech published Tuesday in the party newspaper, Neues Deutschland.

He said there were cases of "opposition, spirit of contradiction, and a growing trend towards bourgeois conceptions. At every step and pace we meet want of clearness and steadfastness."

He explained the "main weaknesses" in party work by their results. One party organization for instance, had held the view "that it does not matter whether West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer takes over the government of all-Germany as long as German unification is reached," he said.

Expect How To Discuss Pipe Line

OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Howe likely will meet with officials of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd. today to negotiate leasing arrangements for the northern Ontario portion of the proposed \$350,000,000 all-Canadian natural gas pipeline, it was learned Tuesday.

The federal and Ontario governments have agreed in principle to finance the expensive Ontario leg under a joint company which likely will be administered by Mr. Howe. Ontario is to put up one-third and the federal government, two-thirds of the estimated \$115,000,000 cost.

The whole line would stretch about 2,200 miles.
