Woman Director Likes Controversy

OTTAWA (CP)—The National Gallery's first woman director is an attractive art historian who thinks controversy plays an important part in arousing public interest in art.

Dr. Jean Sutherland Boggs, 43, former curator of the Art Gallery of Toronto, said at a press conference following the announcement of her appointment that she plans to continue present policies at the gallery, but that she hopes its collection will be added to frequently.

She also hopes the gallery's policy of sending important exhibitions to cities across the country will be continued and enlarged.

Her appointment, announced in the Commons by State Secretary LaMarsh, is effective June 1. She succeeds Dr. Charles Confort who retired last July. Dr. W. S. Dale has been acting director.

IS NOT AN ARTIST
Dr. Boggs is not an artist herself.

She has concentrated on art history.

She graduated from the University of Toronto in fine arts and received her doctorate from Radcliffe College, Harvard.

From 1948 to 1962, she was an assistant and associate professor of art at three American colleges, Skidmore, Holyoke and the University of California.

In 1962, Dr. Boggs was appointed curator of the Toronto Art Gallery.

She left Toronto in 1964 to take up the Steinberg Professorship at Washington University, the first established on this continent for the study of modern art.

DECLINES COMMENT
She said she has discussed proposed government legislation to improve the structure and functions of the gallery with Miss LaMarsh, but declined to comment on what form the legislation might take.

Miss LaMarsh said in the Commons that the legislation is to be introduced shortly.

Dr. Boggs has written many articles on art for Canadian and American publications.

She is also known to Canadians for her CBC radio talks series "Listening to Pictures" which began in 1955 and continued this year.

Dr. Boggs and members of the gallery board of trustees told the press conference that the gallery plans to send an exhibit of Canadian contemporary art to France in the fall of 1967.

It would be the most comprehensive exhibition of modern Canadian painting ever assembled, gallery officials said.
