**St. Mary's Edge Beavers
5-4 In Overtime Play
At Halifax Last Night**

HALIFAX, Nov. 2 — (AP) — A goal at the 24-second mark of an overtime period gave Halifax St. Mary's a hard-earned 5-4 win over Saint John Beavers in a Maritime Senior Hockey League contest here tonight.

The win shoved Saints into a second-place tie with Beavers in the four-team loop. Charlottetown Islanders are in the lead and Moncton Hawks, with only two wins so far, bring up the rear.

Beavers, playing without forward Tommy Brennan, controlled the play throughout the two opening periods and held a 3-1 lead when the middle frame ended.

But Saints regained their form in the third and, after Beavers added another to open the period, shot three tallies past overworked Deris Brodeur to knot the count.

The game-winning goal came when Tim Buck skated through the Beavers defence after a face-off in the Halifax zone. George McGregor, skating in fast on the left side, took a pass and flipped the puck into the lower left corner of the net.

Fourteen penalties were handed out, including two misconducts to Beavers, as the referees kept the game in check. For the first time in this season two linesmen were in use.

The high-scoring Whitlock-McIntyre-Nicolle line accounted for almost all of Beavers' scoring. McIntyre had two goals and an assist; Whitlock had two goals and two assists; and Nicolle had two assists. Blackburn, with an assist, was the only other Beaver to collect a point.

Hughie Campbell was high point-setter for Halifax with a goal and an assist. Other Halifax goals came from Denny Wilkes, George McGregor and Bill Ford.

One of the Halifax goals came while Beavers were short-handed. That was Campbell's opening score for Saints in the second period while Blackburn was serving one of his two penalties of the period.

Roger Jodoin received the first misconduct for arguing with the referee and Eddie Bolan received the same treatment for slapping the boards with his stick while serving a minor.

Duchak, who arrived here about a week ago, will be seeing action with the Islanders Club for the first time in a scheduled league tilt. Vitale has been sidelined with a fractured cheek-bone and Johnny Horeck with rib injuries.

**No "Big" Horse

The inevitable finally happened at the Forum on Wednesday night. The Chamberlain-coached Islanders suffered their first defeat in the 1950-51 Maritime Senior Hockey League schedule after ten successful starts. And it took Les Ramsay's smooth working band of Saint John Beavers' pucksters to do it.

It was a rousing game from start to finish that saw the Beavers take a one to nothing edge in the first frame, the Islanders deadlock the scoring before the end of the second, and a flashing goal by George James in the last 12 seconds of play clinch the game for the victors. Coming up with stellar play-making, the two teams produced the smartest game of hockey to be witnessed here this season.

Playing it close to the ice, it was a terrific display of close-checking hockey both on the offensive and defensive, and although eleven penalties were handed out, only two were out of the minor infraction bracket. Mac Beaton and George James being chased with majors for a brief display of fisticuffs. Out-shooting the Islanders 12-5 in the opening frame, the locals went wide-open on the play in the following two frames to outshoot the opposition 20-8 in the second and 17 to 4 in the third.

**Dodgers Name Rickey's
Aides To Fill His Shoes**

BROOKLYN, Nov. 2 — (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers today named Presco Thompson and Emile (Buzzy) Bavasi, two of Branch Rickey's brightest aides, to fill the big shoes of the departed general manager.

Both Thompson and Bavasi, general manager of Montreal last year, were appointed vice-presidents by president Walter O'Malley who said they will share the general manager duties Rickey handled so ably during the last eight years. The 69-year-old Rickey was until last week, still in manager but he resigned last week.

Next on O'Malley's agenda is the management. Durt Shotton, Rickey's field boss, still is manager. The betting around Brooklyn's headquarters was that Harold (Pee Wee) Reese, Dodger captain and shortstop, would be at the helm when spring training rolls around. Dixie Walker, the "peepul" pitcher in his Brooklyn playing days, also was rated a possibility for the manager's role.

O'Malley, however, indicated Shotton still was in the running. "No decision will be made until I have a good talk with him," O'Malley said. "He is a very fine gentleman."

Last week, after Rickey announced his resignation, Shotton said: "I'd be glad to be back."

Under the new regime, Thompson, who has been in charge of scouting, will handle the club's sprawling minor league system and scouting.

Bavasi, an energetic 34-year-old minor league executive, will assist O'Malley in corporate matters and will be in charge of player contracts and deals.

He also will have a big say in the financial affairs of the Dodgers' triple "A" clubs. The Dodgers own Montreal in the International League and St. Paul in the American Association. They also have a working agreement with Hollywood in the Pacific Coast League.

"The three of us will confer on all important matters," continued O'Malley.

**Jim Konstanty Winner
Of National League Award**

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 — (AP) — Big Jim Konstanty, who rose from obscurity to become the best relief pitcher in baseball today, is the National League's most valuable player of 1950 — a precedent shattering feat.

Konstanty, whose superb pitching featured Philadelphia Phillies' first pennant triumph in 35 years, is the first relief pitcher in either league to win the coveted award.

The 33-year-old specialist gained 18 out of 24 first place votes and piled up 286 out of a possible 336 points to win the award with ease. Only two of the 24 members of the Baseball Writers Association of America who participated in the poll failed to name Konstanty anywhere on their 10-player ballot.

Reached at his Worcester, N. Y., home, the former Toronto Maple Leaf hurler said: "It's something you always work for and never expect. I'm very excited and delighted about it." The right hander praised his teammates and said they deserved the laurel as much as he did.

"I never could have won it without help from the rest of the team. Without them I never could have been mentioned for such an honor," Konstanty said.

Stan Musial, St. Louis Cardinal star, finished a distant second to Konstanty. Musial, a three-time award winner and the League's batting champion, drew one first-place vote and finished with 153 points. The only other players who drew first-place votes were Eddie Stanky of New York Giants and Gran Hamner of the Phils, two each and Ralph Kiner, home run king of Pittsburgh, one.
