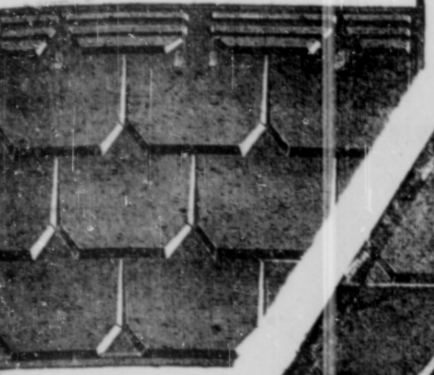

## The Transvaal War

### THE DYING REPUBLIC.

RECEIVES A MESSAGE FROM THE LIVING ONE.

The North American, of Philadelphia, prints the following cable from Pretoria, dated May 29th, which tells of the arrival there of James Smith, the American district telegraph messenger boy, who took the Philadelphia school boys message to President Kruger. The cable says:—

"The message was delivered in the executive chamber at the capitol, through the windows of which came the rumbling of ox carts and the general confusion attendant upon the evacuation of the city by the families of the Boers. The British are reported to be approaching.

"There was an impressive silence in the chamber as the stern and venerable president of the doomed republic bent forward to receive from Messenger James Francis Smith the packet which the boy had traveled 12,000 miles to deliver into his hands.

"Caesar, Nortituri te salutamus," quoted Secretary of State Reitz, as the president accepted the message. Then he added a bitter epigram:—"On this occasion the message is reversed: Caesar greets those about to die."

"This reference to the United States and the message of sympathy from Philadelphia to the president of a dying sister republic profoundly moved everyone present. Tears glistened in the president's eyes as he took the packet from the messenger's hands.

### THE BOER COLLAPSE.

The suddenness of the Boer collapse is explained as follows by a prominent London official:

"Kruger has been forced out. The people of Pretoria, unwilling to follow his fortunes longer, have taken measures to protect the city against a siege and devastation. Kruger has gone to Lydenburg in a final attempt to rally the Boers in that stronghold and the burghers are now saving their property and separating themselves from a lost cause. Johannesburg has looked after its interests in the same way and the Boer generals are not disposed to sacrifice their investments."

It is further intimated in some quarters that Kruger, Botha and some of the Boer leaders have entered into a secret agreement with Milner or Roberts by which the march of the British columns has been expedited and the Boers commandos scattered and kept under restraint with a view to the protection of property and prevention of needless bloodshed. If Kruger has made terms of his own it has been the deepest game ever played by him, but there are those who believe that this has been done and that this has been done and that he has retired to Lydenburg for the purpose of concealing his own arrangements for bringing the war to an end and obtaining guarantees of personal security and immunity from imprisonment. The Boer powers of resistance have weakened so unexpectedly and the British successes have been so rapid and complete that this theory helps to explain what is happening in South Africa.
