## New Detergent Is Announced

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—John and Isaac, a chemical manufacturing company, has announced it is coming out with a new product for detergent formulations.

Called surfactant DM-65, the new product is described as an anhydrous, water soluble liquid that is rapidly degradable by the bacteria normally present in waste disposal systems.

The new detergent concentrate is designed to replace the conventional, water soluble soaps and nonyl phenoxypolyethoxy ethanol type surfactants, where biodegradability is required.

A spokesman for the company said Thursday that synthetic detergents now in use do not decompose under sewage treatment and often appear as foam on streams or in draining water. Biodegradable detergents, on the other hand, he said, are decomposed by bacteria in sewage treatment.
