### FBI Director Shows Concern In President's Safety Trend

WASHINGTON (AP) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover was quoted here as expressing deep concern that "we don't become hysterical and go too far" in setting safeguards for the U.S. president's safety.

The Washington Evening Star said he gave as an example to the Warren commission a visit to Chicago by President Johnson which Hoover said resulted in several people who belong to subversive organizations being placed "almost in house arrest" by local authorities eager to cooperate with the U.S. secret service.

Hoover cautioned that absolute safeguards for the president are impossible without establishing a police state or using Gestapo tactics. He also was said to have revealed to the commission existence of a U.S. state department document indicating Lee Harvey Oswald, the slain assassin of President John F. Kennedy, was a safe risk and had changed his mind about communism.

These points along with his recommendations for tightening safeguards for the president were made to the Warren commission by Hoover in his testimony May 14. The Star reported in a copyrighted story by Jerry O'Leary. The commission has not made Hoover's testimony public but The Star said it had obtained a transcript.

The commission's report issued Monday referred to Hoover's testimony and criticized the FBI as taking "an unduly restrictive view of its role in preventive intelligence work" before Kennedy's assassination. The report suggested the FBI should have told the secret service of Oswald's presence in Dallas before Kennedy's visit.

While the FBI has not commented on this, officials of the agency have indicated they take the criticism bitterly.

Hoover's testimony as reported by The Star stressed none of the FBI information about Oswald indicated any tendency toward violence.

The state department report on Oswald, Hoover said, was based on an interview with Oswald by the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City.

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### Canadian Set To Make History In British House

LONDON (CP) — For the first time in the 699-year history of Britain's Parliament, a Canadian will lead the royal procession when the Queen steps into the House of Lords at the new opening Nov. 3.

Dressed in red jacket, black breeches, gold-buckled shoes and wearing a tabard or coat of rich velvet, Dr. Conrad Swan will escort the Queen to and from the seat of Lords as she makes her traditional speech from the throne.

"Naturally I am greatly honored and I hope I do Canada justice," said the 46-year-old native of Duncan, B.C., who was appointed to the royal household two years ago.

Last June the six-foot-tall expert in heraldry, who holds the official title of Rouge Dragon Pursuivant of Arms, became the first Canadian to lead the annual Garter processions at Windsor Castle.

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Dr. Swan, son of Dr. Henry Swan who practised medicine on Vancouver Island, got his lifetime appointment because of his knowledge of British history. With 12 other officers of arms to the Queen, he oversees titles and arranges ceremonies for state occasions.

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
