Drydocking May Be Necessary For Ferry

The MV Confederation faces a delay of several days and possible return to drydock before starting on the Borden to Cape Tormentine run, the Canadian National Railways public relations department said in Moncton yesterday.

A CNR official reported that the Confederation has a "structural defect" that may force her return to drydock for repairs. He described the condition as a defect in the "locking device" that locks the rudder in place while the ship is moving.

The CNR claim brought a quick denial from E. S. Kehoe, general manager of Halifax Shipyards who built the \$3,000,000 ship for the department of transport and the CNR.

Mr. Kehoe said there couldn't be a structural defect in the ship as it was inspected and passed by the department of transport, the Steamship Commission and Lloyd's during extensive sea trials at Halifax before delivery to Borden.

"The department accepted the ship and the matter is now out of our hands," he said. He has heard nothing of the report that the ship may have to go back to drydock.

The Confederation, according to a CNR report late last week, was due to go into service on the run today. But the CNR

says there is now "no definite date" for her assignment to the run.

The Confederation has been in Borden for more than a week now and never has made any regular crossings. On her first familiarization trip the ship ran into heavy ice and limped to her rudder.

ARE CARRYING ON
Meanwhile the SS Prince Edward Island and the SS Scotia II are carrying on the service while the MV Abegweit is in drydock at Halifax. The Abegweit is due back about June 1.

The CNR dispatcher in Charlottetown reported that the Scotia and P.E.I. had the freight "pretty well cleared up" over the weekend and no pileups are foreseen.

He said 416 passenger vehicles were carried to Tormentine over the weekend and 439 came to Borden. This was not unusually heavy, he said.
