MacKenzie, an outstanding rear guard for the Juniors, scored twice for North River while W. Newson, H. Newson, Dixon and Balderon added single tallies.

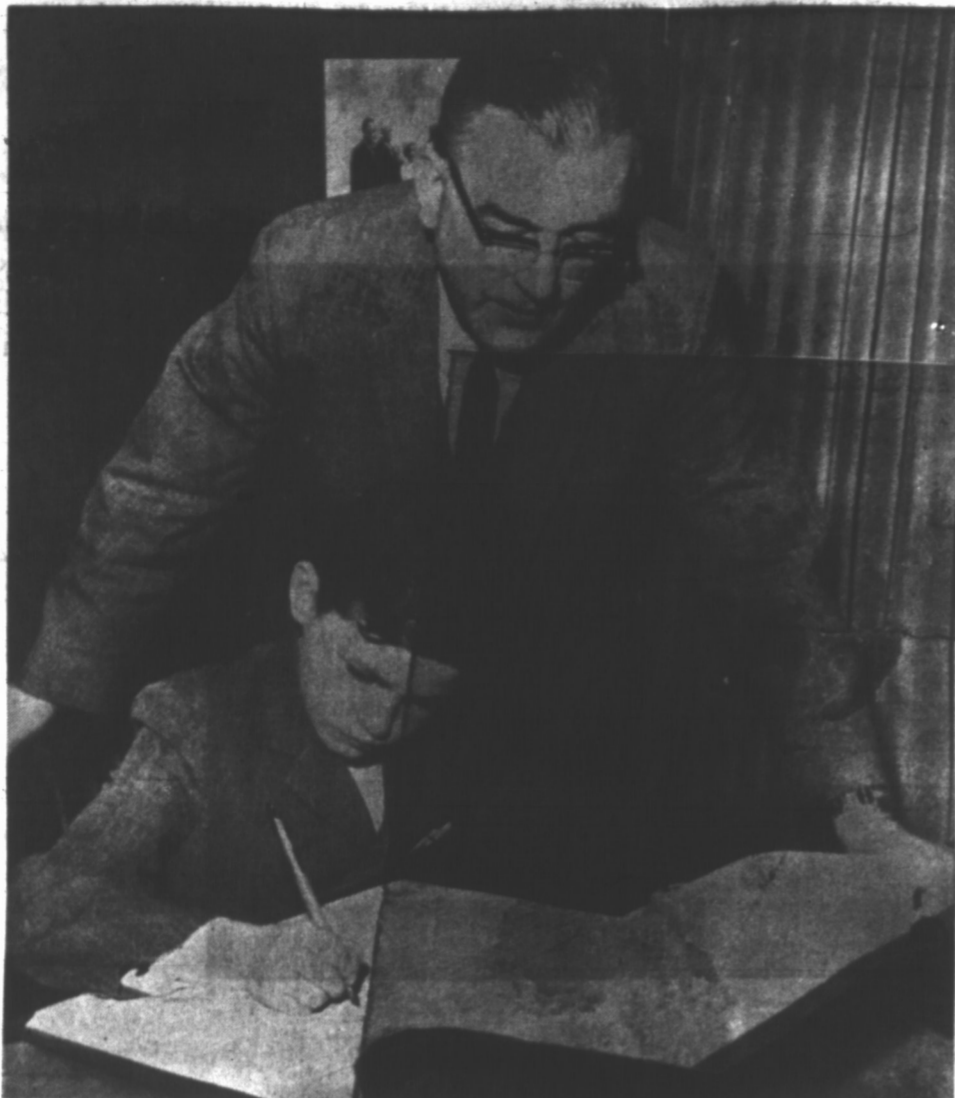

TORONTO (CP) — A love for hockey has left Fred Nash with a broken back and more debts than the 26-year-old father of four children can afford to carry.

Last week, at the nearby Port Credit Arena, Fred fell to the ice during a Port Credit Commercial League hockey match, slid heavily into the boards and broke his back.

Doctors at South Peel Memorial Hospital figure Fred will be laid up for seven to 12 months. This won't help the Nash family for Fred has no insurance, no job and was in debt even before the injury.

Hard luck is no stranger to the Nash family. They moved to Port Credit from their Halifax home three years ago. They had to come to Toronto so that their son, Ricky, 5, could be treated at the Hospital for Sick Children. He was born with webbed feet, two thumbs on each hand and a hole in his heart. He still can't talk.

Referees; A Big Part Of Minor Hockey Ass'n — One of the most vital cogs in the operation of the sprawling Charlottetown Minor Hockey Association, which caters to the needs of more than 700 youngsters in the city and surrounding areas, is the 16-man officiating staff headed by Brian Lewis, referee-in-chief.

The CMHA program is a heavy one, running from seven o'clock Saturday morning to 10.30 Saturday night, plus four evening periods each week, and with one or two referees needed for each game. It amounts to a huge pile of volunteer work. In fact, it is normal for these officials to spend three or four hours in the rink on every Saturday during the winter months.

The amount of cooperation he is getting from his staff is all I have to do to schedule them, and they are there — no worries at all," Lewis said. "And that isn't all; even though they don't get anything for their work, they are right on the job every time, and I know a couple of men who bought themselves new skates this season so that they could do a better job."

Lewis noted the tremendous help the refereeing staff has been given by Dave Boswell's provincial fitness department through the annual clinic and his overall policy to set up a qualified state of referees for hockey all across the province.

Ivan Doherty, president of the CMHA, learned about the value of having a top-flight corps of referees back in the days when he headed the Island Senior Hockey League and had Jack (Spy) Ready as king of the whistle tooters.
