VEHICLE OUTPUT UP

OTTAWA (CP)—Motor vehicle production in Canada continued its upward trend during August with output climbing to 24,052 units from 13,526 a year earlier, the bureau of statistics reported Friday.

Production rose in the first eight months of the year to 353,461 units from 285,719 last year and came close to the high of 355,838 in the first eight months of 1953.

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
