### Makes Hit With Boston Braves And Ford Frick

BRADENTON, Fla., March 13—(AP)—You might say Ed Mathews, Boston Braves rookie, made a hit with Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick the first time they met. In fact, it was more than a hit—a head on collision.

Mathews was chasing a long fly ball in left field near the Braves clubhouse where Frick was talking with Billy Sullivan, Braves' publicity man, and Whitney Martin, Associated Press sport columnist.

The four went down with Mathews clutching the ball and a broken nose.

"That's what you call breaking in with a bang," said Johnny Cooney, Boston coach.

Mathews is liable to run over a lot of people who get in his way this season. The kid is a third baseman by trade with only three years experience. His hitting has been sensational.

"It doesn't make any difference where I play," said the apple-cheeked youngster. "I just want to play ball. My dad planted the idea in my head, before I could hardly walk. Dad would throw, I'd hit and mother would chase them. They always hoped I would be a big league ball player."

Mathews is only 21 now but he was a kid of 17 when a Braves' scout, Johnny Moore, beat a pack of Brooklyn, Detroit, Pittsburgh and Cleveland scouts to his Santa Barbara, Calif., door.

In 1950 Atlanta he cut a wide swath in the Southern Association. Although his batting average was only .286 he hit 24 doubles and 32 home runs and drove in 106 runs. The navy took Mathews after the '50 season.

In the Braves spring training camp Mathews has impressed Manager Tommy Holmes with the power of his bat.

### Phil Cavarretta Faces Big Task

MESA, Ariz., March 13—(AP)—It's a gargantuan task that confronts Phil Cavarretta in his first full season as Chicago Cubs manager—lifting the Bruins from last place by the bootstraps.

It is questionable whether the bootstraps are there to be lifted by Phil—a Cub, man and boy, for 18 years.

The farm system has contributed its usual quota to the Cubs this spring, but Cavarretta can't take too much heart from that, considering the farm system didn't do too much last year, or the year before when the Cubs finished seventh.

In trades the Cubs acquired four newcomers, catcher John Pramesa, pitcher Willard Ramsdell and outfielder Bob Usher from Cincinnati Reds, and outfielder Bob Addis of Boston Braves.

The fair-haired lad of the farm system, catcher Harry Chitt, 221-pound giant, who was to be a bell-weather in the Cub climb out of the cellar, already has been tagged for military service.

Chitt can hit, turning in a .301 mark for Des Moines last season. When he departs, the Cubs will be left behind the plate with Bruce Edwards, a .237 hitter last season; Pramesa, who batted .229 for the Reds; and Toby Atwell, up from Montreal with a .233 average.

While a 20-game winner is the usual pitching gale for managers, Cavarretta has to cast about looking for 10-game winners. Only big Bob Rush topped that mark last year with an 11-13 record. Emil (Dutch) Leonard, who will be 42 (by the book) March 25, won 10, but strictly as a reliever. Ramsdell pitched nine wins for Cincinnati.

### Rizzuto Big Question Mark With Yankees

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 13—(AP)—It little Phil Rizzuto underweight and with a sore arm, going the way of his tattered fielder's glove? And will New York Yankees be able to pull out another American League pennant

this year without the great little scooter scooping them up around the shortfield? Frankly, Phil's Yankee mates as well as Manager Casey Stengel are worrying about the 35-year-old Italian-American native of New York. With Joe DiMaggio gone, the Yankees are looking to Rizzuto as

the man around whom a fourth straight world championship might be molded. "He's the greatest shortstop in baseball and I hear he's also been voted the best in Yankee history," said Casey, who will play Phil only when he thinks he's in good shape. "Naturally I'm going right on refusing to take chances of hurting

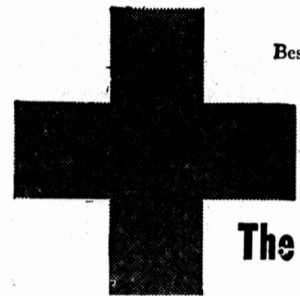
a man like that." But Rizzuto, a fixture at shortstop since he came up from Kansas City in 1941 (except for his three years in military service), isn't worrying about coming apart at the seams. "That doggone glove of mine is making me break out in a sweat every time I think about it," he

said. The scooter recently signed a \$45,000 contract to become the highest paid shortstop in baseball history. He could buy a lot of gloves on that. Yet Phil thinks he can't get along without the glove he's been using for seven years now. He's had it re-covered four times. After

the Yanks cleaned up the Giants in the 1951 World Series, there was a big hole in the glove. Three manufacturers said it was beyond repair. "All I figure is that I'll use the old one until it falls to pieces," he said. "After that I don't want to think what can happen."

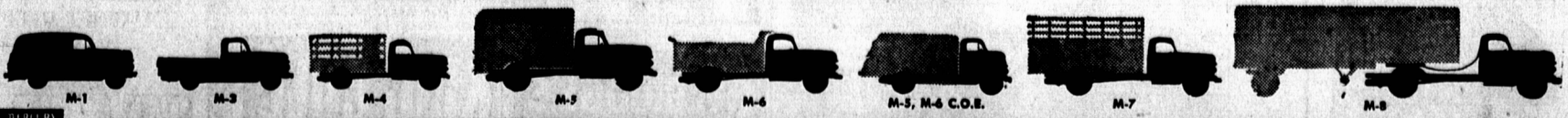
