will be \$10 a month, or \$2.50 a week, instead of \$5 a month, or \$1.25 a week.
5. Under what is known in the trade as revolving credit plans, the minimum initial down-payment will be \$10 and wherever new purchases are made under existing credits the minimum monthly instalment will be \$10.
The Chamber, devoting the brief Wednesday sitting to private members' business, discussed a resolution seeking the elimination of a prohibition on the killing of wild sea birds off Newfoundland. It was introduced by Gordon Higgins (PC-St. John's East).
The credit restrictions came into effect Nov. 1 last and are administered by J. G. Bertrand, formerly of Montreal. He came to Ottawa early in the war as deputy administrator of the Prices Board's rationing administration. He now is an officer of the Finance Department.
