NEW YORK (AP) — Disc jockey Alan Freed has been ordered arrested for not paying a \$300 fine in connection with his guilty plea to a charge of commercial bribery. The charge grew out of the 1960 investigation of payola in broadcasting, and given a six-month suspended jail sentence after pleading guilty to counts charging him with accepting \$2,000 from one record company and \$700 from another to play their tunes. A criminal court judge issued a bench warrant for Freed, who is now living here.
