"SHADOW ON THE WALL" HALF OF DOUBLE BILL AT CAPITOL

From the very first moment the Dell Faring murders Celia, the sister who has taken everything away from her, and then lets the blame fall on Celia's husband, unaware of a secret witness in the person of a six-year-old child, "Shadow on the Wall" holds the spectator in a relentless grip of suspense and excitement. The M-G-M mystery-drama, showing at the Capitol Theatre, is one of the most unusual to come out of Hollywood. First of all, it breaks away from the accepted who-dun-it tradition of not letting the audience know who the criminal is until the final reel. Secondly, it engenders suspense in the characterization of a little child whose mind has become unhinged in the shock of witnessing a crime. The attempts of the murderers to put this little witness out of the way balanced against the efforts of a skilled psychiatrist to restore the child's memory and thus ferret out the true criminal gives the story its emotional validity and dramatic wallop.

The departure from the familiar is also stressed in the casting of "Shadow on the Wall." Ann Sothern, famous for her light comedy roles, leaves the laughs behind for the first time to play the sinister role of the murderess and proves herself as adept at straight drama as she is in the wisecracking field.
