

### Five Houses Holstein Cow Has High BCA

A Prince Edward Island Holstein cow, Saladin Creator Lady, produced 17,586 pounds of milk, 760 pounds butterfat for breed class averages of 151 in milk, 164 in butterfat for owner R. L. Burge, Five Houses, in the 365-day division as a mature cow.

A Kingston cow, Diamond Hill Vimy has qualified as a three-star brood cow for Oswald J. Newson and Son, according to

the current issue of the Holstein Friesian Journal.

Certificates for star brood cows are awarded when three or more of her progeny are classified good plus or better, with breed class averages for production of at least 100 percent in milk and butterfat. Points are awarded for each qualifying son or daughter, according to a scale of standards. One star is awarded for each six points earned by the cow.

### Flood Threat Abates In Some U.S. Areas

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Thousands of workers sandbagged and kept a round-the-clock vigil at dikes along the Mississippi River Sunday, as icy, high water menaced levees.

But in some areas the flood threat abated.

The U.S. weather bureau said the Mississippi, north of St. Louis, Mo., and in the Quincy, Ill., and Hannibal, Mo. areas, had fallen.

The bureau said pressure was lessened by a broken levee in the Quincy area, which spread water over 7,000 acres of farmland Saturday night. Three hundred flood workers were evacuated from the Indian Grave section — the site of the levee break. Ten guard members marooned at a farm behind the levee made their way back to higher ground Sunday when the water level dropped.

Residents of two East Moline, Ill., housing projects have been moving out of their homes for the last two days.

Rock Island, Ill., was untouched behind a brand new seawall, but sandbagging and earth-moving on dikes continued as the river here inched upward to 1.1 feet above the flooding level.

### Track Cleared At Sackville After 20 Hrs.

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP) — Blocked for 20 hours by derailment of 24 freight cars at near-Dorchester Friday afternoon, the CNR main line between Halifax and Moncton was cleared by 11 a.m. Saturday.

A railway spokesman said Sunday night the accident is still under investigation. No one was injured and no estimated of damage was available.

The derailment blocked the only rail line from Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland to New Brunswick and westward. Train passengers were transferred around the wreckage by bus.
