SPIRITED PERFORMANCES.—Residents of the eastern end of the city, particularly about the railway track and Cumberland St. east, are complaining of drunkenness and rowdiness carried on there every Sunday afternoon and evening. Last Sunday the disturbance caused considerable annoyance to everyone in the vicinity with the exception, of course, of the eight or ten jubilant ones who caused it and who departed only after the belated arrival of the police.

THE MARKET.—The market was thinly attended yesterday. There was no hay or oats offered on the square and inside butter sold at from 48c to 50c; eggs, 40c; chickens, 70c to 1.00; ducks, \$1.00 to 1.50 each; fowl 95c to 1.25; plums, 16c to 18c; apples 10c per dozen and crab apples 3c per qt.; vegetables sold at about the same prices as on Friday. There was a scarcity of fish, fresh and corned cod and fresh haddock sold at 8c, and what few mackerel was in sold around 30 cents.

NEW ORGANIST.—It is understood that Miss Lillian Earle, the efficient organist of the Baptist Church of Charlottetown will retire from her present position in the course of two weeks and will be succeeded by W. Duncan, a Mr. P. C. of Glasgow, Scotland. Mr. Duncan has had a lengthy experience as an organist and choir instructor and comes very highly recommended. He will enter upon his duties October 22nd. It is his intention to open a studio for the theory of music, piano, forte and voice culture. Mrs. Duncan is an accomplished vocalist and she and her husband will be valuable additions to the musical talent of Charlottetown.

**KU KLUX KLAN SHOOT'S UP TOWN.**

WACO, Tex., Oct. 3.—The condition of Bob Buchanan, sheriff of McLennan County who was shot when he attempted to prevent a Ku Klux Klan parade at Lorens, 14 miles south of here, was reported today as critical. Two of Sheriff Buchanan's deputies, Louie Gray and Carl West, and an unidentified man, member of Klan, were also wounded.

The clash occurred Saturday night. It took place in the busy section of the town in the sight of several thousand people who had assembled to watch the parade. The Klan had advertised a parade. The sheriff warned it must not be held. After some parleying the Klan leaders decided to proceed with their plans. When fifty white-robed figures began to march, the authorities intervened. A shot was fired and then a succession of shots.

**THE POLES AND BOLSHIEV**

The Riga Treaty stipulates for the payment of 30,000,000 gold roubles by the Soviet Government to Poland. This is in addition to and independent of the value, also payable in gold, of the rolling stock taken away into Russia and not returned. Neither of these sums has been paid. This is the main grievance of the Poles against the Bolshievks. True, to a great extent they have themselves to blame for the delay. An exact date for the payment is not specified in the treaty, and the Bolshievks exhibit no eagerness to part with so considerable a sum out of their dwindling gold reserve.

**A PARRSBORO MAN MURDERED IN N. H.**

PARRSBORO, N. S., Oct. 3.—The body of James Duffy, a former resident of Parrsboro, who is said to have been murdered at Groveton, New Hampshire, is en route to this town for burial, according to word received here. Mr. Duffy was sixty-two years old.

Joseph McGroarty is under arrest on a charge of killing Duffy. The two men quarrelled in a hotel and Duffy was stabbed a dozen times. Duffy was formerly a hotel clerk.

The Canada-U. S. Principle

(New York Commercial)

Secretary Hughes has rightly protested against the American tendency of reducing general description to catch phrases, particularly with reference to the forthcoming armament conference. Mr. Hughes objects to it being called a disarmament conference for the simple reason that it is not a disarmament conference. It is a conference called to discuss the limitation of armaments and not to force the nations to reduce their present effectiveness. Our Government is extremely desirous to have the world fully understand the true significance of the conference. There is no intention to have it try to accomplish the impossible. It is not based on idealism or theory, but upon practical common sense. The leading nations of the world have awakened to the fact that their present scario of naval expansion carries with it a burden that is almost unendurable, and they have begun to ask each other what it is all about anyway. It is such a simple question that it was deemed advisable to answer it before spending more billions. There is, to be a fight between nations it will mean that when it is over the belligerents will have to come to an agreement and the same proposition is now being put forward to come to the agreement beforehand. The boundary line between Canada and the United States has existed for a hundred years without having to be defended by guns. The thought of such a thing is one to create amusement. The principle can

thankfulness of the British and American peoples that peace should have prevailed between them for so long. Its historical importance as a ceremony of topical interest is heightened by the fact that it should come so closely before the international conference on a reduction of armaments which is to be held at Washington in the near future. Its significance is further increased by the comradeship in arms between the two nations on the battlefields of France and in the mists of the North Sea.
