



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

At Quebec track recently Joe C. Blackstone won the BB Pace in 2:09 4-5, 2:10 1-5. He was No. 58 in the catalogue at Harrisburg late last fall and had then a half-mile track record trotting of 2:07 4-5 and pacing 2:12 and was eligible to the 2.22 class. He sold for \$500 and apparently was a real bargain. At the same meeting Indian Land, owned by Joseph Cauchon, Quebec, and driven by Giguere, was 1-1 in the Free For All Pace, time, 2:07 2-5, 2:07 4-5.

A horseman was asking us the other day if we had heard anything about Sailor Hal by Guy Hal, that was sold by a party in Saskatchewan last fall for \$5,000 to J. Ulisse St. Marie. At the above meeting he won the 2.24 class pace stake, purse \$1500 with 1-1, time 2:10 1-5, 2:10 1-5.

At Tillsonburg, Ont., the three-year-old pacer *Lee Boy*, owned by Ellis Dell of Becher, Ont., won the \$4000 Superstee Three Year Old pacing stake with 2-1, Barney Diplomat 1-3. Time, 2:08, 2:09 2-5—certainly fast stepping for three-year-olds over a half-mile track. At Sherbrooke the pacer Harold Abbe 2:02 3-5, that was one of the high priced bargains at Harrisburg last fall, won the Free For All with 1-1, time, 2:08 3-5, 2:06 3-5. Dr. Parker was 4-2 and L. E. M. 2-5.

Among the winners at the July 21st meeting at Woodstock, N. B., was the three-year-old pacer *Titan's Lucy* by Titan Hanover, owned by Bob Brown, Woodstock, with driver Troy up, time, 2:15 1-5—a new record for her. Second was Linda Belle (Jenson) owned by Cecil McGinley, Houlton, Me. In the 6th race with the same field Beck Dale, owned by Mrs. A. Langille, St. Stephen, and driven by Al Langille, won in 2:18 1-5 with Titan's Lucy 2. In the 3rd and 7th races Top Royal, owned by L. R. Halliday, Calais, Me., and driven by Billy Bart, was 1-1, time 2:18, 2:14 3-5—a new record. She is a three-year-old. In the 4th and 8th races the four-year-old pacer Hedgewood H. by Volo H., owned by C. Rose, Woodstock, with driver Killam up, was 1-1, time, 2:13, 2:13—a new record. In the 1st and 5th races honors were divided. Bonnie H. (Morey) won the first in 2:21 3-5. She is owned by W. Stiles, Woodstock. Heinie Henley (Killam) was 2. The 6th race was won by Lucky Spencer, owned by R. Hamilton, Woodstock, and driven by Myron MacArthur, with Bonnie H. 2. Time, 2:21 3-5, 2:17 2-5—a new record for Lucky Spencer on the trot.

Saturday night's racing at Woodstock saw a sensational performance by the three-year-old pacer mare Margy Frisco. We received the following wire from Colonel Jim Kalkin regarding it:—"Henry DeWitt's three-year-old filly Margy Frisco won the C Pace here Saturday night from a good field of aged horses including *Piedmont Gold* 2:07 3-5, *Mighty Grand* 2:12 2-5, *Dominion D.* 2:13 4-5 and *Hedgewood H.* 2:13. She started from fifth position both times and won on the outside of track. Time 2:11 4-5, 2:11 4-5. The last half of the second heat was in 1:05 2-5. Thanks, Jim, and we are proud to congratulate our friend J. Henry DeWitt, who bought this filly as an unbroken yearling at Lexington the fall of 1951 and has given her all her training and drove her to one of the fastest records ever taken in the Maritimes by a three-year-old. Hedgewood H. was 2-4, *Dominion D.* 3-2. The same night in the 1st and 5th races Hero's Child by Hero Mine, owned by W. B. Nevers, Hartland, and driven by McAduff, was 1-3. Connie Clegg, owned and driven by L. E. Britton, Hartland, 2-1. Time, 2:19 1-5—a new record for Hero's Child. In the 2nd and 6th races Riot Jr., owned by F. Robbins, Exton, Me. and driven by him, was 1-2. Beck Dale, owned by Mrs. A. Langille and driven by A. Langille, was 3-1. Time, 2:15—a new record for Riot Jr. and 2:14 1-5—a new record for Beck Dale. The 4th and 8th races were won by Skelter, owned by Bob Brown and driven by Troy; Royal Jr. (Langille) 2-5, *Mighty Bold* (MacArthur) 3-2. Time, 2:11 1-5, 2:10 1-5. Those who have followed the summaries at Woodstock will notice that a lot of trotters and pacers are taking new or reduced records regularly.

At first we thought Margy Frisco's record was the fastest for a three-year-old in the Maritimes, but the pages of memory stirred and we remembered that Billy Keyes had had a three-year-old named J. D. Direct by Napoleon Direct in the spring of 1931. He had taken a record against time at Springfield, Ill., mile track on July 3rd of 2:06 1/4 and as a member of the Keyes stable won at Halifax, Charlottetown and Fredericton. At the latter track on September 18th in the 2.24 pace he was 1-1-1, Saint Henry 3-2-3, King Spruce 4-3-2, The Willys 2-4-4. Time, 2:12, 2:11 1/2. That same afternoon Lucky Lindy, owned and driven by Wellington McNeill) won the 2.16 trot and pace with 1-2-1, Dude McKivo (Keyes) 3-1-5, three other starters, best time 2:11. The 2.22 trot was won by Golden owner and driven by the writer, with 1-1-1, time, 2:14, 2:12, 2:12. The following afternoon Abbe Worthy, now in the stud at Frank McKay's farm, won the 2.14 trot from Edna McKivo, 3-1-2-1, best time 2:12. Royal Bank, owned by Frank Ryder of Moncton, is the holder of the Maritime bred record for three-year-old pacers which was set up at Truro last September—2:12 2-5.

Free Spirit, owned by Bob Hamilton, is still credited with the fastest mile paced this year in New Brunswick when he won at Woodstock recently in 2:09 1-5. The next fastest mile was Abbebrand's 2:09 2-5 at Chatham, July 1st. Bob Brown's Titan's Lucy is still the fastest mile paced in the Maritimes to date featured Saturday night's racing at the Charlottetown track. The old rivals Babe Britton, Abbebrand, Johnnie Kalmuck, A. G. Scott and Direct Mite, gave the spectators plenty of thrills as they raced from wire to wire with very little space separating them. Babe Britton, that had taken a record of 2:06 4-5 previously and one which very few expected her to lower, was really on high outpacing. Johnnie Kalmuck and Abbebrand in the 4th dash to win in 2:08 1-5, which is one-fifth second faster than the other best Maritime performances by Abbebrand at Charlottetown and Lucky Chief at Sydney—2:08 2-5. Babe won the 7th race with the same field in 2:09 3-5. Johnnie Kalmuck, owned and driven by Walter Kelly, was 2-7, Abbebrand (Goguen) 3-2, *Josedeal Clipper* 4-6. The Babe was driven by Len O'Meara, the man who has raced her so consistently, and she is owned by George Thompson of Summerside.

In the 1st race Sleepy Sam, a new performer, won for Joe Hennessy in 2:18 4-5. This is a new record for Sleepy Sam, that apparently can pace several seconds faster. The trotter Anyway, owned by Roy Bevan and driven by Harold Stead, won the 2nd race in 2:17, but the surprise in this event was the steady trotting of Judy Kalmuck, that Lorne Kelly piloted to a very close second. In the 3rd and 6th races Lady Breadbane, owned by Claude Smith, Breadbane, and driven by C. Smith, had the best summary with 1-2. Good Luck, a pacer that has improved wonderfully with Walter Craig up and is owned by H. E. Johnson, was 7-1. Time, 2:18 2-5, 2:14 3-5. His win gave him a new record. In the 5th and 8th dashes Dale B., owned by George Hughes, Brackley, and driven by Harold Stead, was 1-4, Marion E., owned by C. O. Ellis, O'Leary, and driven by Lorne Kelly, was 4-1. Time, 2:14, 2:14 4-5.

The combination horse and stock car racing drew a crowd estimated at between 4000 and 5000 to the Summerside Raceway last Saturday night. The harness racing consisted of three races with two dashes each. The 1st and 4th races were won by Abner the Great, owned by James Heffell and driven by George Sobej, Vallie Long (Lowery) 5-2, Amico (Somers) 2-6. Time, 2:17, 2:15. The

HUNTERS' CORNER

July has been temperamental this season... a combination of lowering cloud, high, cold winds, torrential downpours of rain with a seasoning of hail and soft warm days when sparkling blue waves lapped on sands as soothing to ones bode as water to bottle. She relented during the last week and gave us weather such as we expect during mid-summer. August now has taken over control and after mid-month we may expect a fall like atmosphere to develop. Evenings and nights are tangy and the cloud skud takes on a wild appearance as if taking flight from the frost legions.

August is the month when we take stock of our Hun crop. Farmers have completed haying, or nearly so, and the covers of partidge have been spotted in the process. The outlook is encouraging at the moment. One farmer has reported three covers averaging 16 to 18 birds each on the front section of his farm with at least one covey at the rear of his holdings. These covers were reported about 10 days ago and since then we have had some nasty squalls. For instance, on Tuesday of this week a belt of rain and hail several miles wide swept over Montague and across Queens County in a line with Lyndale and Hazelbrook.

The squall lasted approximately 25 minutes and after it was over cart boxes in farmers' yards held six or eight inches of ice in the form of sizable hail stones. Housewives took advantage of the opportunity and dug out ice cream freezers to give their men folk a treat. To what extent such squalls cut down on our Hun and Pheasant crop remains to be seen but some losses from drowning and exposure are bound to occur. Farmers have reported losses among young chickens caught in the open by this torrential rain-fall but mothers in the wild have a sort of sixth sense that prompts them to take their charges under cover before the storm breaks. Time is a factor that cannot be overlooked and if suitable cover is not at hand they are sometimes caught napping. By the first week in September a definite announcement may be expected regarding our Hungarian partridge and pheasant prospects for the current shooting season which opens on October 10th.

The black duck outlook looks good although there is a wide difference in the ages of the different broods. Many families are following their mothers in experimental flights while other broods are barely out of the down stage. This week I spotted one brood of 10 black ducks that were less than six inches long and a yellowish spot
