Britain's Hill Wins Grand Prix

MONTE CARLO (AP)—Britain's Graham Hill in a BRM Sunday became the first three-in-a-row winner of the Monaco Grand Prix for Formula One cars, in a fierce battle between British BRMs and Italian Ferraris.

Italy's Lorenzo Bandini placed second in a Ferrari, and BRM driver Jackie Stewart of Scotland placed third.

World champion John Surtees of Britain was in the running in the top three until the last lap when his Ferrari ran out of fuel. He pushed the car over the line for a technical finish.

Australian driver Paul Hawkins in a Lotus 33 plunged into Monte Carlo Bay with a huge splash amid luxurious yachts anchored there. Officials said he was not hurt.

SPORT RECORD SHATTERED

Seven new records were set by students from various high schools in the Queens County Inter-scholastic Track and Field Championships events staged at Memorial Park Saturday afternoon.

Bill MacKinnon, representing St. Dunstan's High School not only broke the boys 100 and 200 yard dashes with marks of 10.5 and 24.3 seconds respectively, but set a new mark of 18.1 feet in the broad jump.

Two PWC students also set new records. Don Lothian broke the 440 yard dash with a record of 58.1 seconds while Rhoda MacLeod set a new record in the girls' division with a throw of 91.5 feet.

The boy's eight-pound shot was put 52 feet nine inches by Tracy Johnston, Queen Charlotte High School, to set a new record in that event while Heather MacLean, also of Queen Charlotte, set a new girls' high jump record when she soared to a height of four feet seven inches and also tied

Acquired from Pittsburgh Pirates in a straight shortstop swap for Jose Pagan, Schofield adds to his value every day with the Giants. He has hit safely in all six games for his new mates, building a .364 batting average.

And against the Reds, he led off with his first homer of the season, kept Cincinnati from moving ahead in the fifth inning with spectacular fielding and then got a seven-run rally started in the sixth inning by walking and scoring the run that put the Giants ahead to stay.

Ron Brown clouted a second inning home run for Enman Drug.

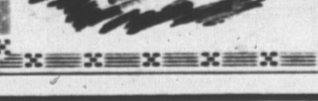
