Mr. Herbert W. Yeo, retired principal of West Kent School, died suddenly at his home on Greenfield Avenue yesterday morning.

In his 61st year, Mr. Yeo had been confined to his bed for the past year and a half, and was suffering from a heart condition. He was principal of West Kent School for many years and held the respect and esteem of all the pupils who came under his guidance. Many of the students at West Kent were winners of City scholarships during the years he spent there. He joined the staff in 1914, was made vice-principal in 1919, and principal in 1933. Mr. Yeo was forced to retire in June, 1949 because of ill health.

Mr. Yeo had held different positions on the executive of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, including that of president.

He was a member of the Charlottetown Baptist Church, and was a member of a wide circle of friends. He took a keen interest in his former students and followed their varied careers with the deep concern for their welfare which had made him so popular as a teacher.

Mr. Yeo is survived by his wife the former Margaret Jones of Pownal, and by four sons and one daughter. One of the sons, Ira, resides in Summerside, and the others live in Charlottetown. They are Ralph, Arnold, Kenneth, and Grace. There also survive two brothers, Dr. Ira J. Yeo and Dr. H. E. Yeo, Charlottetown, and five sisters, Mrs. W. P. McVie, Montserrat; Mrs. Mabel Jones, Halifax; Mrs. Ewen Martin, Tea Hill, and Miss Helen and Miss Alma, Charlottetown.

The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning at nine o'clock.—S.

Four-year-old Roger Ghiz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Atallah Ghiz of this city was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital when he fell out of the same car. He was reported to be resting comfortably last night.

Roger first fell out the door and Miss Dow, a first cousin of the little boy attempted to catch him.

Miss Dow, about 20 years old, was flown to Halifax by Capt. Carl Burke of M.C.A. in a forty-five minute flight. Halifax hospital authorities reported she was resting comfortably.

Miss Dow is a niece of Mr. Atallah Ghiz and arrived in this country from overseas about four months ago.

The City of Charlottetown might improve its traffic facilities by installing parking meters and traffic lights, and by forbidding taxi operators to use valuable downtown parking areas, said Mr. Alan S. Stewart, City Clerk and Solicitor of Owen Sound, Ont., in his address to Rotarians at their luncheon yesterday.

Traffic in Charlottetown like many places is becoming heavier and it is a good sign, said Mr. Stewart. More business means more traffic, and the resulting prosperity is not an unmixed blessing. He commended the City Council for paving the areas be-

tween the street and sidewalk in the business sections, which facilitated the movement of traffic.

In Owen Sound the installation of traffic lights at principle intersections made a great improvement, he said. He noted in driving about Charlottetown that lights might be advantageously installed at Great George Street, Elm Avenue, Euston, at Great George Street and Kent, at City Hall (Queen and Kent), and at Queen and Grafton. These lights, costing between \$700 and \$800 would speed up traffic, save time, and temper and possible tragedy.

A resolution endorsing the proposed potato marketing plan in this Province, and urging "that an orderly plan of marketing that will curtail speculation and price cutting, be also implemented in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia," was passed at the first annual meeting here yesterday of the Island Co-op Services Co-operative Association, Ltd.

Also passed was a motion stressing the value of dealing in quality products and recommending "that quality in all our products be the aim of all co-operative dealers operating in conjunction with the I. C. S."

The following directors for the ensuing year were elected: Messrs. Rod MacNeil, Alberton (re-elected); Malcolm Reeves, Southport; and G. L. Monkey, Kensington. Retiring directors are Messrs. William Delaney, Kensington, and John Rodd, Milton.

The body of Mr. Hutt was found yesterday by Mr. Maurice Perry who was walking along the shore. Dr. W. A. Shea, the coroner, conducted the investigation and the body was identified. He then decided that no inquest would be necessary.

Two fishermen were lost when their boat tipped over at a sand bar and turned over as they were returning to the harbour. — S

Word has been received in Summerside by her nephew, Mr. Harris Rideout, that Mrs. Margaret Roehner, former superintendent of the Prince County Hospital, was seriously injured on Sunday when her car, for some unknown reason, left the highway and crashed into a telephone pole. The accident occurred about forty-five miles west of Quebec City.

Prince County was visited yesterday afternoon and evening by one of the severest electrical storms for some years. The storm was accompanied by heavy gusts of wind and pelting hail about four-thirty in Summerside and vicinity. Several large trees were damaged in Summerside but there was no report of any building being struck.

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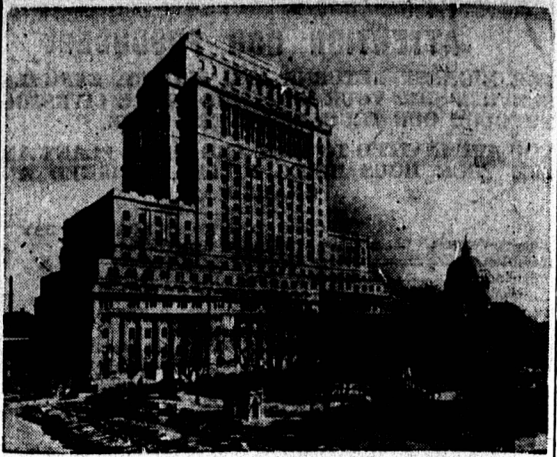
