Variety Concert At I.O.O.F. Hall

A large number of Rebekahs, Oddfellows and friends attended a Variety Concert in the I.O.O.F. Hall, Montague, recently, sponsored by Acme Past Noble Grand's Club.

Mr. C.A. Shaw acted as Master of Ceremonies; and pianists during the evening were Mrs. J. M. Fraser, Mrs. D.M. MacDonald, Mrs. Colin MacDonald and Mr. John MacKinnon.

The program featured a one-act comedy, entitled "Sardines", under the direction of Mrs. LeRoy White. In the cast were Mrs. Archie Hickey at the guest from New York; Mrs. D.M. MacDonald as the hostess; Mrs. E.H. Stewart as the maid; and Mrs. J.D. MacLeod and Mrs. Spencer Llewellyn as local residents. Each character was well played and deserving of the hearty applause.

The program opened with an original welcome song by Miss Florence MacDonald, followed by a group of choruses "Three's Music in the Air", "When Irish Eyes are Smiling" (soloists: Mrs. Douglas Coffin) and "Mother MacRee" (soloist Mrs. Arnold Wightman). Mrs. Coffin and Mrs. Wightman were later heard in two beautifully rendered vocal duets "The Rose of Tralee" and "My Wild Irish Rose". Two vocal solos, "Daisy Boy" and "Smiling Through" were rendered by Gwyn Phillips.

NOVELTY NUMBER
Gwyn was a big hit with the audience in his role of conductor in a novelty number "McNamara's Band". Also taking part in this number were Barry White, Wayne Nicholson, Malcolm MacPhee, Malcolm MacDonald and Garnet McIntyre. Gwyn and Barry were soloists.

Tap dance numbers by four young ladies, Marcia MacDonald, Elaine Poole, Heather Jamieson and Joanne Waterworth, and two solos and a tap dance number by Florence MacDonald were added attractions.

A very special number was a group of songs by Mr. Malcolm Munro, Miss Jean Anne Munro and stock. Corn, wheat, barley, oats, coffee, and sugarcane are grown in the Yungas, which occupies about one-quarter of Bolivia.

We were only about an hour in flying east from the world's highest commercial airport at La Paz on the Altiplano to the Cochabamba airport, located at 8,000 feet above sea level. In passing over this labyrinth of regional barriers at 18,000 feet, one passenger, who refused the oxygen mask, blacked out, and it was fifteen minutes before she was restored to consciousness. This great mountain barrier, with only a few very high passes, prevents one region from supplying another with its products. After the Altiplano, the smiling Cochabamba valley seemed like an agricultural garden area.

(3) The third region is called the Llanos or lowland plains. These cover more than two-thirds of the land area of Bolivia and are drained by the great rivers: Abuna, Madre de Dios, Beni, Mamore, San Miguel, Guapore and others which are tributaries of the Madeira River which joins the Amazon in Brazil. The Llanos is sparsely populated and largely covered with tropical jungle. There are large tracts of fertile land that are now being improved.

THE PROBLEM OF DEVELOPMENT
Great areas of land are unused or unfit for cultivation, transport facilities are inadequate to move home grown food to where it is needed. The general health level is low with life expectancy being about 38 years. About 4 per cent of the people are engaged in mining. This small group, however, are the ones that secured the foreign exchange to pay \$20,000,000 annually for imported foodstuffs. Bolivia's economy was largely dependent on tin.

The United States under its Technical Cooperation Program, known as FOA (Foreign Operations Administration), started in 1942 to give assistance to Bolivia, as one of 19 Latin American republics to participate in this Mutual Security Program which was authorized by Congress for 40 countries in the free world. Briefly, this program includes activities in health and sanitation, agriculture, education and transportation.

(1) Health and Sanitation: This cooperative program started in 1942 to control disease through health facilities, immunization campaigns, health education. Thirteen health centres and four mobile health units serve in an effort to control typhus typhoid, diphtheria etc.

(2) Agriculture: This cooperative program started in 1942 to control disease through health facilities, immunization campaigns, health education. Thirteen health centres and four mobile health units serve in an effort to control typhus typhoid, diphtheria etc.

(3) Transportation: With two-thirds of its people living more than two miles above sea level, transportation is one of Bolivia's greatest problems. The airplane has revolutionized travel for many. In 1948, a start was made with surveys and plans, for 21 Bolivian airports. We landed and took off from three of these, at La Paz, Cochabamba and Oruro, where great numbers were using them,

and reservations had to be secured weeks ahead. A fourth airport at Santa Cruz is used by most of the South American airlines. Some others are under construction, and these all have gravel runways. The high valleys and the Oriente have recently secured a real land connection by the opening of a highway from Cochabamba to Santa Cruz, so that tropical crops may be moved economically from the productive lowlands to the highlands.
