

True Bills Are Found In Two Indictments On Docket

In the Supreme Court, Queens County, which opened yesterday in the Grand Jury room, the two true bills in the two indictments appearing on the docket.

In one case Harry McGee of Chateaufort is charged with the intent to wound causing bodily harm to Glendon Edwards of Newfordland, a member of the crew of the C.G.S. Saurel. The incident is alleged to have taken place in Charlottetown on the evening of December 24, 1957.

Following arraignment yesterday, the accused pleaded not guilty and his case will be heard commencing today.

The second criminal case on the Supreme Court docket charges that Theresa Pineau of Mayfield with the intent to defraud did endorse a cheque for an amount exceeding \$400. Arraignment in this case will not take place until Thursday morning.

CHARGE TO JURY

In his charge to the Grand Jury at the opening of the Assizes yesterday morning, Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy reminded the jurors that "It is not enough to have good laws, they must also be well administered."

After outlining the general duties expected of the jury, he read to them a report from the Jailor of Queen's County Jail, which gave a complete breakdown of the number of prisoners and the various offences for which they had been placed in custody.

The members of the Grand Jury are: William Brown of Charlottetown, foreman; Arthur McInnis Jr., Lucien Kelly, both of Charlottetown; Cyril MacMillan, Central Royalty; Harold Dunphy, Millview; John Nicholson, Mount Buchanan; W. J. Bowman, Hunter River; Edward Trainor, Hermitage; Eric Bell, Hope River; John Dooley, Mt. Edward Road; and George W. Dewar, West Royalty.

During the afternoon the jurors inspected various public buildings and institutions.

Impaired Driving Leads To Fine

Charged Tuesday morning in City Police Court with drunken driving, an accused entered a plea of guilty to the lesser charge of driving whilst his abilities were impaired by alcohol. Accepting the plea, Magistrate K. M. Martin imposed a fine of one hundred dollars and costs or twenty days.

Another drunken driver was remanded until today. Three drunk and incapacitated were each sentenced to twenty days in the Queen's County Jail.

Kensington Fire Assistance Fund Shows Surplus

The regular monthly meeting of Kensington's Town Council was held Monday night. Mayor Champion presided.

Bills amounting to \$709.81 were ordered paid.

The police report showed that fines amounting to \$35.00 had been collected during the month past.

The meeting decided to purchase new valves for the chemical engine.

In reviewing the financial report the Council noted that the Fire Assistance Fund had accumulated a surplus for the year 1956 of \$612.00 and that receipts for this fund for 1957 amounted to \$551.20. This fund is paid into by districts surrounding the town which depend on the Kensington department for assistance in case of fire. Expenditures amounting to \$391.85 were made during the year for fire hose and cash in the bank was shown as \$571.95.

Report Shows Crime Wave In City Declines

Reporting to the City Council at the regular meeting Monday night Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur, said that the wave of offences of breaking and entering which took place during the month of November, continued during the early part of December, but tapered off toward the end of the year.

The extra precautions which have been taken by the Police Department were attributed by the chief to have been partially instrumental in bringing about this decline. Due to this vigilance, over the past two months, four men have been committed to Dorchester Penitentiary and nine others are in custody in the Queen's County Jail. All of these were convicted for breaking, entering and theft or robbery.

Summarizing the activities of the department, the Chief reported that during the month of December a total of seventy-five arrests had been made for various offences. Out of these seventy-five convictions had been obtained, one had been sent to a higher court and another was unfinished. The number of arrests is down by sixteen from the previous month.

Continue Work On Mine Shaft

NEW YORK (CP)—M. J. Boylan, president of Brunswick Mining and Smelting Limited, said Tuesday work will continue on the company's main production shaft near Bathurst, N.B.

Boylan issued a statement from the headquarters of St. Joseph Lead Company, parent company of Brunswick, saying:

"At a board of directors' meeting of Brunswick Mining and Smelting Limited held in New York Tuesday it was determined to complete the sinking of the main production shaft to 973 feet by a target date of May 1, 1958.

"Notwithstanding today's low metal prices and tight money, it was also decided to continue negotiations for the financing of a

2,000-ton concentrator and lead smelter at Bathurst, the construction of which would take an estimated three years and involve a cost in excess of \$30,000,000."
