

# Address To Graduates By Archbishop Skinner

Following is the text of the address to the graduates at St. Dunstan's University graduation exercises yesterday by the Most Reverend P. J. Skinner, C. J. M., D.D., Archbishop of St. John's, Newfoundland:

I should first express my thanks for the very kind words of introduction, and at the same time assure you that I am pleased to have another opportunity of further binding the links of fraternal charity which exist between Charlottetown and St. John's. While referring to the friendly relations between our Dioceses, may I take this occasion to express my own deep gratitude for the kindness shown to Bishop and Clergy of Charlottetown, and most recently in 1955, when we celebrated the Centenary of our Cathedral Church.

It has been my pleasure to be present here on two very important dates in the history of your Diocese, namely the Centenary of St. Dunstan's university, and the Formal Installation of your reverend Bishop. May I be permitted just to add one more thought in the order of good relations, by saying that it is a great happiness for me to meet once again with the priests I have known at Holy Heart Seminary, and to enjoy the rather pleasing impres-

sion that they seem to have forgotten, and yet they have not forgotten.

### INSPIRING HISTORY

The history of St. Dunstan's University is truly an inspiring one. It is almost a spiritual commonplace to say that the firm solidity of any institution, of any enterprise in the Church, is conditioned especially by the degree of sacrifice that goes into its very beginnings. It is striking to see the uphill struggle of St. Dunstan's the foresight and courage of the Bishops, the tremendous self-sacrificing labours of those great educationalists who have persevered in the face of great difficulties, to bring St. Dunstan's to the place of importance it occupies today. So often we of the present generation are inclined to forget the sacrifices of the past. Yet it is in remembering these sacrifices, and recalling these stories, that we are spurred on not only to maintain what has been established, but to seek to progress and develop more firmly and broadly, to meet the needs and requirements of another age.

To the students of today, I should like to say that one of the best means of keeping alive the spirit of this institution, and of bringing it with you into the future, is to keep before your mind

## Local Welfare Bureau Changes Name At Meeting

A change in both the organization's name and its executive featured the first annual meeting of the Protestant Welfare Bureau, held on Tuesday evening at the Y.M.C.A.

Now to be known as the Protestant Family Service Bureau, Charlottetown, the organization will be headed during the coming year, by Norman W. Lowther, Q. C., who was named president, succeeding Edwin C. Johnstone, the past president.

Other members of the executive, elected following the report of the nominating committee, which was presented by R. J. Rupert, are: Vice-president, A. S. Tait; secretary, Victor Ling; treasurer, George A. Purvis; directors, Frederick A. Large, Q.C., Mrs. Gordon Lawley Carson, Charlottetown; Elizabeth Maude Foster, Marshfield.

### REPORT OF PRESIDENT

Following the opening prayer by Rev. G. Howard Christie and reading of the minutes of a special meeting by Mr. Purvis the acting secretary, the President, Mr. Johnstone, presented his report.

Having warmly welcomed all present, he briefly traced the growth of the Bureau from its initial stages to the present, the assistance received from various interested individuals and groups, and the appointment, in March, 1956, of Mr. Walter O. Baker as Executive Director.

Referring to the work already accomplished, he said "I suggest to you that this is only a beginning, since the public as yet does not fully understand that the Bureau provides services for any Protestant, unmarried mother throughout this Province, nor has it yet become generally understood that an agency of this sort can help from every income level through help with marriage counselling, budget planning, and assistance with the every day emotional and disciplinary problems

## Restrictive Building Areas Bylaw Is Passed

City Council yesterday morning gave third reading and thus approved a by-law to amend the by-law respecting restrictive building areas. The amendment removes Elm Avenue from the area previously designated as restricted in regard to the erection of business premises. First and second readings of the by-law were included in the program of Monday night's regular Council meeting.

At the Monday night meeting, the Council passed the following resolutions: in addition to that concerning the purchase of a fire engine pumper.

That the week of May 13th-May 18th be proclaimed "Clean Up Week" in the city.

That the tender of Keith Carmichael for supplying the City with one Super 33, gear reduction saw, 3 1/2 H.P. 15 inch blade with McCann Auger attachment, be accepted, at a price of \$412.50.

That the City Clerk be authorized to purchase from Douglas Bros. and Jones Ltd. 2 twenty-one inch Automowers, model 6100 with 2 H.P. motors for the price of \$259.90 less trade-in-value for three old mowers of \$49.50, making a net cost to the City of \$210.00 be accepted.

That the City Clerk be instructed to call tenders for the installation of a vault in the City Hall.

## Many Applications For Farm Labor For Province

Cold and adverse weather has retarded the commencement of a number of construction jobs in Charlottetown and there are still quite a number of people drawing Unemployment Insurance benefits, both in Charlottetown and in Kings and Queens Counties. The Charlottetown National Employment Office has administrative jurisdiction over these two counties, only. It is believed, however, that much the same conditions exist in Prince County which is serviced by the Summerside Office.

The Charlottetown Office has a large number of applications for farm labour, and is having great difficulty in filling these orders. Many young men from the country districts are obtaining work in Toronto and other Ontario centres. Within the past few days, the office, with the help of the Regional Office in Moncton, has been making vigorous efforts to obtain jobs. It is believed, however, that much the same conditions exist in Prince County which is
