The hope and aspirations of each one will be at a peak when the decision of the judges will finally be made known at coronation ceremonies during the dance.

The newly proclaimed queen and her eight princesses will then be guests at a private reception for Lieutenant-Governor W. J. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald and other invited guests.

Judging for the contest will be done by a panel of three whose names will be made known just prior to the official opening. The competition will be judged on a points basis with consideration being given to talent, poise, personality, charm, and beauty of face and figure.

### Canadians Get Tribute

LONDON (CP)—The Guardian quoted Dr. Eric Williams, prime minister of Trinidad and Tobago as saying here "the Canadians are primarily responsible for asserting the ideas and principles of the modern Commonwealth."

The tribute came amid serious criticisms by the West Indies leader, a member of the Commonwealth peace mission on Viet Nam, of the way Britain conducted the 14th Commonwealth prime ministers' conference last month.

The front-page story by Patrick Kestley, the Paper's Commonwealth correspondent, says Dr. Williams said on the eve of his departure from London he was not the only Commonwealth prime minister to be disturbed by an impression that "these meetings only existed to approve British policy aims and needs."

Dr. Williams is quoted as saying he had come with firm instructions from his own cabinet not to vote for any candi-

OTTAWA (CP)—Appointment of three new parliamentary secretaries from among the ranks of Liberal MPs has been announced by Prime Minister Pearson.

J. J. Jean Chretien, 31, MP for St. Maurice-Lafleche, a lawyer, was named Mr. Pearson's second parliamentary secretary, succeeding Guy Rouleau (L-Montreal-Dollard) who resigned when the Dorion enquiry was established.

David G. Hahn, 40, MP for Toronto Broadview, a businessman, parliamentary secretary to Industry Minister Drury.

Bryce S. Mackasey, 43, MP for Montreal Verdun, parliamentary secretary to Health Minister Judy LaMarsh.

Donald S. Macdonald, MP for Toronto-Rosedale, who has been parliamentary secretary to the justice minister, parliamentary secretary to Finance Minister Gordon, succeeding Larry Pennell, named solicitor-general last week.

Jean-Charles Cantin, MP for Quebec South, who has been parliamentary secretary to Transport Minister Pickersgill, to succeed Mr. Macdonald as parliamentary secretary to Justice Minister Cardin.

John C. Munro, MP for Hamilton East, who has been parliamentary secretary to Health Minister LaMarsh, parliamentary secretary to Trade Minister Sharp.

### Mining Official Reports On Great Advances In Europe

LONDON (CP)—A western Canadian mining official said here the advances made by Europe in mining in the last 10 years have been an "absolute revelation."

R. M. Porter, manager of operations at Kimberley, B.C. for Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada, is one of a number of Canadians attending the fourth international mining congress. He also has visited a concurrent exhibition of the latest in mining machinery developed by Britain and the Continent.

Britain already has one completely-automated mine and congress delegates say some continental countries are keeping pace with Britain in introducing radical new methods to increase production and reduce the number of workers sent into the pits.

"There's a tremendous amount to be learned from the coal miners and their technical advances in Europe in the last 10 years," Porter said in an interview.

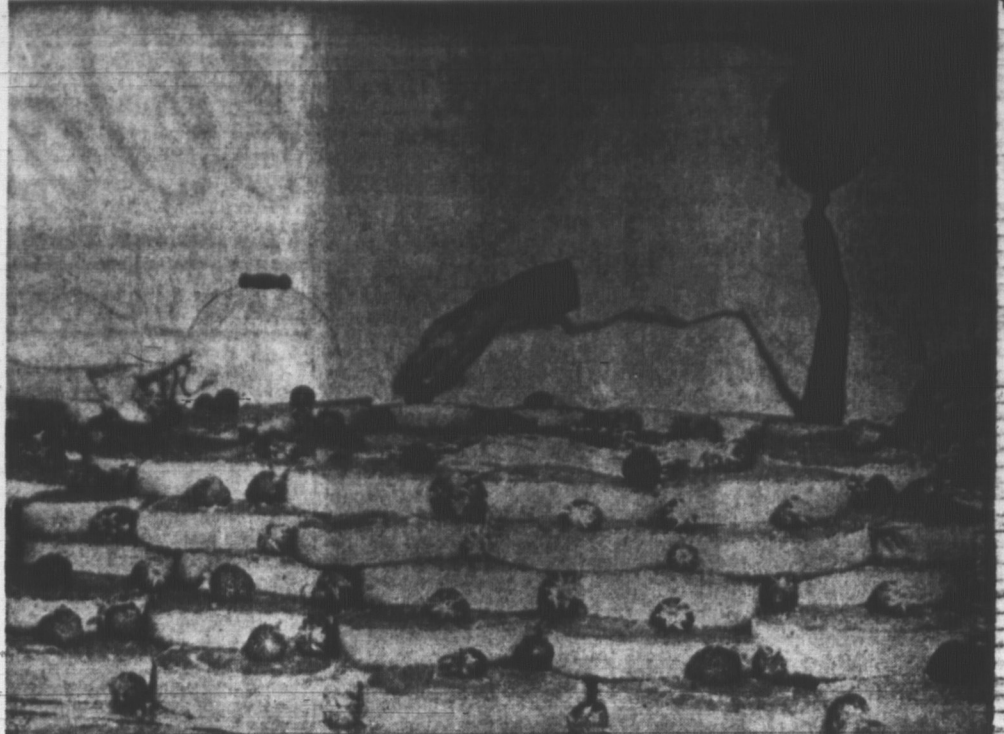

He said he's getting much technical information from various congress sources, including the Russians.

"The Russians have been very helpful and they're well advanced in techniques."

Another Canadian, J. E. Morris, vice-president for mining, Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, Fernie, B.C., said his company is planning for a major expansion program. He's looking over prospects for placing machinery orders in Europe.

C. L. O'Brian of Ottawa, chairman of the Dominion Coal Board, is combining attendance at the congress with a holiday for himself and his wife.

He said there are some similarities between the Canadian and British systems of mining coal because of comparable
