

Bill Capser Takes Lead In \$26,800 Golf Tournament

BO'CHATEL, Que. (CP)—Bill Capser, Jr., of San Diego, Calif., running down long putts second round today, finished with a score of 136 at the halfway mark.

Stan Leonard of Lachute, Que., who was only one stroke away from Stranahan's first-round 67, took a par 72 Friday to join half a dozen others in the 140 bracket. A Capser turned pro two years ago and this year currently is 17th in money earnings on the pro circuit with about \$9,400.

VICTORIA (CP) — California distance swimmer Amy Hilland was pulled out of the Strait of Juan de Fuca Friday a heart-breaking 1 1/2 miles from her Vancouver Island destination. Her left arm was reported paralyzed and she was blinded by salt. She had been in the water 12 hours, 15 minutes, 8 seconds, an endurance record for the strait swim. When pulled out, Mrs. Hilland was unable to understand directions, was swimming in the wrong direction and sobbing. She had to be tied to a rope and pulled into a boat after an assistant dived to her rescue.
