

Three Freighters Loading Pulp, Potatoes At S'ide

For the third time this year three ships are docked at the Marine Wharf in Summerside, busily engaged in loading operations. The Sandia is loading pulpwood for P.E.I. Produce Co., Ltd. This ship had some 1,100 cords on board when she arrived and is completing her cargo by loading 500 cords at Summerside. Loading operations were expected to be completed in time for the ship to sail last night or early today. She will sail for overseas.

Also docked on the east side of the wharf is the Liverpool Rover which docked early yesterday morning. This ship is being loaded with a cargo of seed potatoes for George Brodies of Kensington. On the west side of the wharf is the Atlas Hugo Stinnes, which brought a cargo of fertilizer here, and is now loading seed potatoes for MacFarlane Produce Co., Ltd. Loading operations were expected to be completed last evening, and all was in readiness for her immediate departure.

Another large ship, the Nepal Trader, is expected to arrive this morning to load potatoes for Canada Packers Ltd.


