

# Cornwall Edges Out Geo'town 7-6 In Opener

The Cornwall Bulldogs squeezed out a 7-6 victory over the Georgetown Eagles in a Saturday night game at the Georgetown rink, the first of the home and home series for the intermediate B hockey championship for King's and Queen's Counties. It was a fast heavy checking game which kept the large crowd on their toes throughout. The Eagles led at the end of the first period 1-0 on a pretty goal by H. MacLean assisted by Landry. Cornwall went ahead 2-1 at the half way mark of the middle frame as Acorn and Taylor sank goals. The Eagles came back with scores by MacLean and MacNeill to end the period 3-2 for the locals.

In the final frame the visitors outscored the tiring locals 5-3. An Eagle score in the first period was disallowed when the referee overruled the goal judge, and a Cornwall goal in the final period was hotly argued by the Eagles who claimed a player in the crease batted in the puck while holding his stick above his head.

Stellar goal keeping was the feature of the contest.

NEW YORK, March 23 — (CP) — Bill Mosienko, high-flying right-winger set a National Hockey League record for the fastest three goals tonight as he led Chicago Black Hawks to a 7-6 victory over New York Rangers in the final game of the season for the two clubs.

**DETROIT 7, MONTREAL 2**

DETROIT, March 23 — (AP) — Gordie Howe scored three goals and linemate Ted Lindsay two as Detroit Red Wings wrapped up regular season activities in the National Hockey League by blasting Montreal Canadiens 7-2 here tonight.

Howe boosted his season total to 47 goals, second only to Rocket Richard's 50 in 1944-45 among the all-time goal scorers in one season. Howe also added one assist, building his season point total to 86 to equal his own N.H.L. mark set a year ago.

Lindsay, with two goals and one assist, finished runner-up to Howe with 69. In the past week Lindsay had overtaken Elmer Lach of Montreal for second place, and the \$500 league bonus. Howe collected \$1,000. Terry Sawchuk also came in for a share of the glory by finishing 21 goals ahead in wrapping up the Vezina Trophy.

# Confident Islanders Ready For Big Opener; O'Hearn Likely To Play For Saints

A quietly confident team of Charlottetown Islanders rested over the week-end in preparation for the opening game tonight of their M. M. H. L. semi-final series against Halifax Saint Mary's.

Every man from Club President Dr. F. C. Dougan down felt the Islanders could take the measure of the Saints after a tough struggle Coach Leo Lamoureux was confident his boys could do it in six games.

It was after one o'clock this morning when Col. S. C. Oland's Halifax Saints arrived in the City. The Saints had planned to take an M. C. A. chartered flight yesterday evening but the flight was cancelled due to the widespread search for the missing M. C. A. plane.

The Saints flew to the Island by T. C. A. and landed in Summerside. They motored from Summerside to Charlottetown.

With the Haligonians was goalie Don "Nipper" O'Hearn whose status still was not completely settled. Early Saturday M. A. H. A. President Walter Lawlor was informed that O'Hearn was ineligible but yesterday evening Islanders President Dr. Dougan was told by George Dudley, Secretary-Manager of the C. A. H. A. that O'Hearn could play as the result of a new arrangement between Halifax and Springfield.

Under the new agreement Strachan is being sent to Springfield of the Eastern Amateur League as a sub-goalie, and thus it was stated there was nothing to prevent O'Hearn from coming to Halifax. Previously it was planned to send Strachan to Syracuse but this move backfired when the Chiefs were eliminated from A. H. L. play.

Mr. Dudley told Dr. Dougan that O'Hearn could not be sent to Springfield since he was a professional player and Springfield is an amateur club. It is also believed that Strachan is a professional as he was sub-goalie for Syracuse before he came to Halifax. Both Syracuse and Springfield are owned by Eddie Shore.

Saturday morning Walter Lawlor had received the following telegram from J. S. Dudley of the C. A. H. A. "I have had a telephone call from the President of the N. H. L. (Clarence Campbell) and feel that there is no manner in which a replacement can be allowed in Halifax case as Syracuse is out of the competition in pro hockey and they can not need a replacement at this stage of season.

At midnight last night Mr. Lawlor had not received word of any change in O'Hearn's status. Until Lawlor is informed O'Hearn will be unable to play.

The Islanders held a workout Saturday morning and rested throughout yesterday. One player who could not rest, however, was defenseman Johnny Dutchak. The big blueline belter, a first officer with M.C.A. was out on the search

# Bill Mosienko Sets New Record

NEW YORK, March 23 — (CP) — Bill Mosienko, 30-year-old Chicago Black Hawks right winger, set a National Hockey League record for the fastest three goals by a single player when he rammed the puck past New York Rangers goalie Lorne Anderson three times in the space of 21 seconds tonight.

The previous record was one minute and 52 seconds set by Carl Liscombe with Detroit Red Wings against Chicago March 13, 1936.

Mosienko's quick scoring effort also eclipsed another N. H. L. record—the fastest three goals by a team. Previously, the quickest trio had been scored in 24 seconds by Montreal Maroons in 1932.

Gus Bodnar got assists on all three of Mosienko's goals to set a N. H. L. record for the fastest three assists. The previous record of 81 seconds was set by Don Raleigh of the Rangers against Montreal Nov. 16, 1947.

Mosienko got No. 1 in the lightning string at 6:09 of the third period. He got the second at 6:20 and the third at 6:30.
