I. object to the large banquets being given each fund-raising campaign, particularly Red Cross, for the following reasons: (a) The cost of feeding the campaign managers and some collectors often runs into hundreds of dollars. (b) We are all working people and as such, our money comes by hard work, so that when we give to a worthy cause we want to feel that our dollars go to that cause and not to feed the collectors. (c) Campaign managers and collectors are given much praise for being public spirited gentlemen. Let them show their public spirit by helping out these causes without benefit of free meals which must be paid for out of sorely needed funds. Well over one hundred delegates attended the convention which was held in Howe's Hall, Brackley Point, and these represented all of the following Institutes. East, West and Central Royalties, Spring Park, Springvale, Parkdale, Brackley, Harrington, Brackley Point, Highfield, South Winsloe, South Milton, and North Milton.
