GAMPAIGNING.

In closing his campaign Sir Wilfrid Laurier is reported to have stated that he has spoken in every constituency in Canada east of Port Arthur. In making this statement he does not wish it to be understood, we suppose, that he has done this in his tour during the past month, but within the past several months, during which time the matters affecting the present campaign have been under consideration. Campaigning is coming to be a heavy strain upon the leaders of the political parties. Time was when the leaders contented themselves with addressing big meetings in the leading cities of the different provinces, but that day is gone and now every constituency in the Dominion considers itself entitled to see and hear the political leaders.

But marked as the change is it is still a fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Charles Tupper have not attempted the herculean tasks undertaken in the United States by Mr. Bryan for the Democrats and by Mr. Roosevelt for the Republicans. The

Mr. Roosevelt's record beats anything known in presidential elections in the United States—beats Mr. Bryan's record in 1896 and his record of this year—and beats the combined records of a dozen previous presidents.

In the campaign Mr. Roosevelt has been the storm centre—a very fury of activity.—Toronto Daily Star.
