### Rail Revenue At Record Level

OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—(CP)—An interim increase of eight per cent in freight rates, and higher material costs during 1949 boosted operating revenues and expenses of Canadian railways to record levels, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Operating revenues during the year amounted to \$894,397,264 compared with \$875,32,290 in 1948. Operating expenses climbed to \$831,456,446 from \$808,126,456. This resulted in the reduction of net operating revenues to \$62,940,818 from \$87,705,835 and of net operating income to \$30,558,818 from \$33,162,876.

Revenue freight tons declined 7.9 per cent to 142,719,431 tons from 154,932,904, and ton miles were down 4.6 per cent. Revenue passengers declined to 34,883,803 from 38,279,961 and passenger train mileage dropped to 407,421,226 from 410,689,409.

Total number of employees rose to 192,396 from 189,963 in 1948. The payroll reached \$53,453,375, an increase of \$11,398,580.

### Leader At World Convention Due S'ide Next Week

Fresh from the inspiration of the World Convention on Christian Education, Mr. Whitney Dalrymple will direct a Leadership School for church school workers in Summerside next Monday to Thursday inclusive, Sept. 25 to 28. Mr. Dalrymple, boy's work secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council, led a discussion group at the World Convention held last month in Toronto, when 5,000 delegates from sixty-two countries met to discuss, to learn, and to share the joys and sorrows of the task of Christian education in all parts of the world. Seven delegates came from countries behind the Iron Curtain.

Co-director of the School is Miss Ada E. Adams, children's work secretary of the M. R. E. C., who served a term as missionary on Formosa, and is second to none in children's work in Eastern Canada. Local leaders include Mrs. R. Louis Cairns, with wide experience in youth work in British Columbia; and Mr. E. Allison Proffitt, nationally known for his interest in agriculture, who has done much for Christian education.

Each evening, Monday to Thursday at 8 p. m., in Epworth Hall, Summerside, workers in all Sunday Schools of the Kensington-Summerside local district will have the opportunity, in joint study and discussion groups, for real practical help in all phases of Christian education; nursery, primary, junior, and intermediate and senior work, with a special group for Superintendents and officers. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings the sessions will open with devotional periods led by Sunday Schools of the district; main feature of the final evening, Thursday, will be sound films.

Three years ago a similar school was held at Kensington with an attendance at each session of over one hundred. The school to be held next week, Sept. 25-28, in Epworth Hall at eight each evening will be even more worthwhile, following as it does the history-making gathering last month in Toronto when Canada was host to the World Sunday School Convention. Church School workers from outside the district are cordially invited to attend and share in the instruction.
