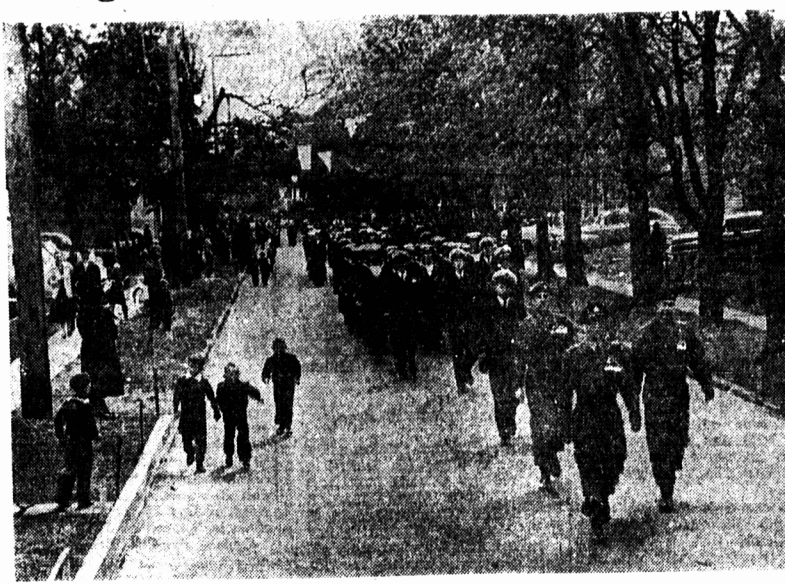

Rome and Berlin. On the African continent, too, white and native inhabitants celebrated. In Kenya, British and native troops marched side by side in a Coronation parade, but in the British territory of Nigeria young nationalist-minded Africans tore down Coronation decorations on a rampage through Lagos, the capital city.

Splice The Main Brace

Free candy was handed out to children in many Commonwealth countries and there was something for the grown-ups too, at least for Commonwealth sailors in Japan. There, Vice-Admiral E.G.A. Clifford read an order from the Queen, instructing all British ships in the Far East to "splice the main brace" - meaning to serve up rum.

Some 1,500 Commonwealth sailors at a ceremony aboard the aircraft carrier Ocean at the Seabed base, southern Japan, cheered wildly as the order was announced and shouted "God save the Queen."

In Uruguay and many other parts of the world, girls born to date were named "Elizabeth" and boys "Philip." In Southern Rhodesia, newly-born African babies were carried on their mothers' backs to open-air services for the Queen at Salisbury.

2,000 Tots In Parade

Older children took as much delight as adults in the world-wide celebrations. In Canberra, Australia, 2,000 tots dressed in red, white and blue lined up in a formation to spell out the words "our Queen." A crowd of 10,000 gathered in front of Parliament House applauded.

Continued from page 1 form the centuries-old ceremony of trooping the color in honor of the young Queen crowned across the seas. In the evening and long into the night more tens of thousands celebrated amid programs of fireworks, music, and more spectacle, topped by a water-borne flotilla that went sailing down the Rideau canal.

More Than 100,000

There seemed little doubt that an original estimate that 100,000 people would pack downtown Ottawa during the day would not only be realized but surpassed. But it was the major afternoon program that fired imaginations and brought cheers welling out even from normally-undemonstrative capital-city crowds.

Governor-General Arrives

And at last the Governor-General himself arrived, his landau carriage drawn by four horses, his journey shielded by a mounted escort of the R. C. M. P.'s finest. He stepped from the carriage and then went to the head of the platform. All around him, in every direction, there was sheer spectacle to underline the statement in his brief remarks that "We are assembled here to do honor to our sovereign and to join in an act of public rejoicing."

It was a tough assignment for the 65-year-old Governor-General, but he took it in his stride. For 33 minutes his white-gloved right hand was raised in almost continual salute. Picturesque in his white-plumed, black cocked hat and black ceremonial uniform, braided in red and gold, the Queen's representative stood on a raised, red-carpeted platform in front of the Peace Tower, attended by his personal aides, the heads of the three services.

From the rooftops then came the bright glare of trumpets as his standard was lowered and that of the Queen was raised on the flag pole of the Peace Tower. The hands, massed together on the paved walk between the two lawns, played until the signal came that the Queen was about to speak. Her voice, broadcast across the sea, came out firm and clear while the troops stood at attention.

And then they stood at ease and answered the Governor-General's call for three cheers for the sovereign. The bands played "O Canada" and "God Save the Queen." In the distance guns fired a 42-round salute and in the skies overhead a minor armada of more than 100 R. C. A. F. planes approached.

Controversial Discussion In Council Over High School

The question of religion cut sharply into the debates of the City Council when it met Monday night to discuss what could be done about erection of new high school facilities for Charlottetown.

A stated lack of funds for the purpose made several Councillors express the belief that the City could afford to erect only one such school and caused them to express doubt that two buildings could be erected and maintained as cheaply as one.

The principal argument advanced when Councillor Edwin C. Johnstone introduced a resolution in the form of a reply to a letter from the School Board dealing with the matter, one paragraph of Councillor Johnstone's reply touched off the verbal battle and when the matter was voted on the Council divided sharply.

The contentious paragraph ended with the sentence: "In expressing this view the Council wishes to go on record as opposing any building programme which would result in greater costs to the taxpayer due to additional buildings or buildings fixed, others without any particular group."

When reading his reply Councillor Johnstone stated that if two high schools were needed from an educational standpoint he would support the move, but not if they were being built purely for sectarian reasons.

Amendment Lost - Councillor P.R. McCormac moved that the section above quoted be eliminated from the reply. On a standing vote he was supported by Councillors M. Alban, Farmer, Arthur Gormley and George Keefe. The motion was opposed by Councillors Johnstone, Cudmore, MacDonal and Storey. On the tie vote Mayor J. D. Stewart cast the deciding ballot and declared the motion lost.

During the debate on the issue, Councillor Storey noted that in this city there was a religious segregation during the school years but when people grew up they had to live and work side by side regardless of beliefs. He was of the opinion that a better understanding would be achieved and a greater tolerance known if children went to school together from the beginning of their education, regardless of their religious beliefs. He expressed his personal opinion that the City should be a more tolerant community.

To Proceed With Chip Sealing On City Streets

At a City Council meeting Monday night Councillor F. J. Storey, chairman of the Street Committee, offered a resolution that the amount of \$48,026.69 be repaid to the Warren (Maritimes) Limited out of the \$125,000 surety bond they had posted for street work done last year.

He also pointed out the necessity for chip sealing certain blocks in the city and it was decided that the work would proceed at a cost of approximately \$10,000. Councillor MacDonald felt that this amount would be better spent in paving even one block.

There was some discussion regarding street areas paved last year which had broken up. Councillor Storey said they were localized sections and that the Warren Company had fulfilled its contract and any redress for faulty work should be addressed to the inspection service which had passed on the work. Certain other sections of streets had to be built up on the basis for chip sealing next year the chairman said, and this work would cost \$6,500. Councillor Storey opposed any alteration in the Street Committee plan as he felt that chip sealing was highly necessary in Ward 5 where citizens had only 30 percent paving and a great many old dusty streets.

Councillor Storey did not believe that the proposed expenditure should come under the financial heading of capital outlay as he thought chip sealing was an improved form of maintenance. If the estimates could not carry this he felt that it was not unusual to have a carry-over deficit to another year. Mayor Stewart remarked that it would be very unusual in an election year.

Coun. Storey felt that chip sealing would give comfort to "thousands of people" for from three to five years.

Tribute to Major Rogers

At the conclusion of the Council meeting Mayor Stewart stated that he wished to officially note the death recently of a former City Councillor, Major T. B. Rogers. His Honor paid high tribute to the late sportsman and patriot.

Big Increase In May Ferry Figures

Traffic figures issued by Northumberland Ferries for the month of May show impressive increases in every category over the same month last year. Passengers ferried over the route increased by 1530, with a total of 6799 this year as compared with 5269 in May 1952.

An increase of 534 autos ferried brought the total to 1822, as compared with 1288 last year and an addition of 113 trucks carried this year brought the total to 793 as compared with 782 ferried in May of last year.

Reservations for the season period to the end of May this year totalled 599 as against 321 in 1952, an increase of 278.

Fine Fireworks Display At Race Track

A colorful display of fireworks lasting for about 20 minutes, was given on the grounds of the Charlottetown Exhibition Association last night by the City Fire Department.

In keeping with the Coronation Day celebrations the Firemen arranged to have a set display of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth along with the flag. They also gave an impressive fireworks display of Niagara Falls.

The display, given between the fourth and fifth races of last night's racing meet, took place on the field inside the racing oval. The firemen were loudly applauded for their showing.

In addition to the display of the Queen, flag and Niagara Falls there was the shooting of rockets and flares and other objects that go to make up such a showing.

Shown above is the big parade as the marchers moved along Fitzroy Street yesterday for the Coronation ceremonies at the Exhibition Grounds. Leading the group is Lieut. Col. A. W. Rogers, officer commanding the parade, who is followed by Capt. Lloyd MacNevin and RSM, John Smith. Immediately back of them are troops from H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte under command of Lieut. K. MacKenzie.

As the blue standard of the Governor-General was broken out beside the saluting base, Brig. M. B. K. Gordon, head of Canada's 7th reserve infantry brigade, swung his troops into sight to the beat of drums and the cheers of the excited spectators.

The troops marched six abreast, their rifles at the slope, some with bayonets fixed, others without. They included hardened war veterans and young cadets, swaggering Highlanders, stiff-backed infantrymen, airmen, sailors and women of the three services.
