REFUGE FOR KRUGER.

BOER PRESIDENT ASKED FOR AN ASYLUM IN U. S. CONSULATE.

President Kruger at one time made a formal application to the United States to grant him a sanctuary in case the necessity for it arose. This occurred, according to Secretary of State Reitz of the Transvaal Republic, the day Lord Roberts entered Pretoria.

The details of the event have been related to a representative of the Associated Press by Mr. F. W. Unger, who has just returned from the Transvaal, and who secured the information from Secretary Reitz and others. After quoting the secretary as saying President Kruger would never take to the mountains on account of his age, but would retreat down the line, eventually escaping to Portuguese territory, Mr. Unger said the day the British entered Pretoria President Kruger sent for Mr. W. Stanley Hollis, the United States Consul at Lorenzo Marques, who was taken to Macbadodorp in a special car.

President Kruger asked him if the Government would grant him (President Kruger) an asylum in the Lorenzo Marques Consulate until he made other arrangement for his departure. President Kruger expressed fears concerning his treatment by the Portuguese Government, and wished to guard against any possible British landing parties. Mr. Hollis asked for time to consult with his Government, and President Kruger assured him he would receive a week's notice before putting the plan into execution.

In consequence of this visit to the Transvaal and the transmission of President Kruger's request to Washington, Mr. Hollis received instructions from Secretary Hay not to leave Portuguese territory again. He was thus compelled to neglect the interests of the British prisoners at Noolgedacht, where there was great suffering.

Mr. Unger, in conclusion, said: "I make this explanation in justice to Mr. Hollis, whose action has been misunderstood both in America and Great Britain."

Mr. Unger did not know whether the State Department eventually gave a specific answer to President Kruger's request.

ONE OF BRITAIN'S LITTLE WARS.

The public mind has been so occupied by the Boer war and the Chinese complication that the minor affair of the siege of Coomassi, far north on the west coast of Africa, has been overlooked. Coomassi is an inland town in the state of Ashantee, on the deadly Gold Coast, reeking with malarial fever. An enormous army of natives attached the little British garrison there with its handful of British and native soldiers, and for almost two months they held out against terrible odds. Casualties were numerous and disease made havoc in the ranks of the defenders, until finally starvation was added to the horror. Sir Frederick Hodgson, Governor of the Gold Coast and leader of the gallant band, at last made his way to the coast with his plucky comrades. This is but one of the many little wars of Great Britain always in progress in some corner or other of the world. They are so frequent that people as a rule pay scant attention to them, yet they are all part of the work in building up the empire and the work is always stained red with British blood. A significant feature of this Coomassi fighting is that the native Yoruba soldiers fought for the British with the greatest hero-

ism and were mentioned with pride by the officers. Great Britain has the rare genius of making loyal subjects and good soldiers out of the people over whom she rules, whether they be black, white or yellow. Her native troops all over the world are among the best. The Sikhs and Gorkhas of India were anxious to fight in the Boer war, and the Indians in the North-West wished to send an Indian force to South Africa. In the Boer war, too, the Zulus and the Basutos freely offered large forces of armed warriors to the British to aid in suppressing the Boers.

THE YANGTSE VALLEY.

One of the points of greatest importance at the present moment is the attitude of Germany on the Yangtse question. The protest of the French and Russian consuls against the proposed landing of British troops at Shanghai is a serious matter and cause much anxiety there, all the more that it is now scarcely possible or at any rate very difficult for Great Britain to retreat from the position she has taken up. Much depends on the view which will be taken by Germany. If the Emperor should support France and Russia in opposing the British action a grave situation might easily arise. Meanwhile British transports are lying off Shanghai many thousand troops ready to land.

A semi-official despatch from Shanghai dated Wednesday, Aug. 15, says: "The foreign consuls acting on a joint resolution, have sent to their respective governments the following telegram:

"If the Indian troops (British) are withdrawn from Wusung it will constitute a menace to the safety of Shanghai. These troops ought to be landed on the basis of an international understanding. To ensure the adequate safety of Shanghai more troops ought to be landed immediately."

A NEW DEFINITION OF LARCENY.

In the city of Washington a certain colored attorney was once retained for the defence of a negro youth who had entered a shop and appropriated some article, but before he could make good his escape the boy was detected and forced to surrender the stolen property. The stand the lawyer took was that no larceny had been committed, inasmuch as the defendant had been relieved of the stolen matter before he had left the premises from which it was taken. He quoted, as parallel, that a man might enter the field of his neighbor and drive off his horses or cattle until he reached the boundaries of the field, but unless he passed them, no charge of theft could be made, as that property was guarded by those limits, and therefore still in the owner's possession. No matter what evil intentions may have been entertained by the man, said he, the failure to pass these limits precluded his guilt, or rather prosecution for the same.
