CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION ON SUNDAY

The annual Corpus Christi procession will take place tomorrow from St. Dunstan's Basilica to Notre Dame Cathedral where Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be given by His Excellency Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan from an altar erected at the entrance. The procession will take place following the parish High Mass which will be held at 10 o'clock instead of 11 as usual.

Shortly before 11 o'clock the League of the Cross band will accompany the congregation and societies of the Holy Redeemer Parish to the Basilica where they will form up with the St. Dunstan's Mass. The route of the procession will be as follows: Great George, Richmond, Weymouth and Sydney streets to the Academy entrance. After the Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament has been given the procession will reform and will proceed by way of Sydney, Hillsboro, Water and Great George Streets to the Basilica.

Effect of Legislation

What has taken place since the depression insofar as the mortgage departments is concerned? Possibly any branch of operation is in evidence in that department. Two factors are responsible for this: firstly, the natural and necessary desire of the trust companies to have their affairs so arranged as to present a strong and liquid position in view of the uncertainty of world financial conditions. Secondly, owing to legislation which was being passed in a number of provinces, particularly in Western Canada, restricting the rights of mortgagees and prejudicing their position. It is not necessary to stress the importance of the financial institutions keeping a reasonably large proportion of their assets in liquid form; the wisdom of this policy has been amply proven.

Although provincial 'Debt Adjustment' legislation has not spread to the eastern provinces, mortgage moratorium legislation was in effect in almost all provinces for a short time. When the present Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act was being debated in the House of Commons last year it was stated that the principal necessity for such legislation was that there were practically no new mortgage funds available to farmers of the Dominion, and some of the leading Federal government supporters at the time stated that this condition had come about due to debt adjustment and moratoria legislation. When asked if it were not likely that an act which would not only postpone the collection of a mortgage debt, but which would permit its reduction to any extent which members of the board might decide would not more prejudicially affect mortgage loans, the reply was that it was to be hoped that it would not, and it was felt that a greater understanding between debtor and creditor would result from the intended legislation.

It is not intended to make any comment in this article upon the merits or demerits of the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, but at the time of writing it is a fact that no trust companies operating in Canada feel that they can invest the funds of widows and orphans entrusted to them in farm mortgages. Insurance and loan companies have also completely withdrawn from the farm mortgage field.

The following article by Mr. C. N. Bisset, B.A., LL.B., Manager of the Eastern Trust Company, Charlottetown, appears in the current issue of The Monetary Times:

In view of the fact that the combined assets of Canadian trust companies have increased from \$1,217,000,000 in 1926 to \$2,721,000,000 in 1935, the question may well be asked: "Were the trust companies adversely affected by the depression as were practically all other types of Canadian financial institutions?"

A most important department of all large Canadian trust companies is that of corporate trusts, covering bond trusteeships, registrarships, transfer agencies and other fields of corporate activity. Once the depression had become established in earnest corporate financing by means of issues of bonds and debentures simply could not be attempted by the average Canadian corporation, so that new bond trusteeships for trust companies were few and far between. Practically every share of stock traded in upon the leading Canadian stock exchanges must of necessity be transferred and re-registered by some trust company acting as transfer agent and registrar, and with stock market trading having declined to a minimum this branch of the corporate trust department had its activities seriously curtailed.

The real estate department of the trust company form a most important part of the institution, and it is needless to state that the volume of business of such departments was very seriously diminished with the restriction of real estate activity all over the Dominion, particularly in the larger centres.

The late Mrs. Hayden was born in Georgetown, P. E. I. and was educated at Mount Allison University, New Brunswick.

Describes Expansion Of Canadian Trust Companies During Depression Years

Despite the fact of the decrease of business in the three departments mentioned the assets of Canadian trust companies more than doubled in the past nine years and have attained a total ranking only second to our Canadian banking institutions—and a very close second at that. This expansion has been steady and consistent. In the first three years after the depression set in assets of Canadian trust companies increased by \$338,000,000 in the year 1933 the increase was \$97,000,000, in 1934, \$100,000,000, and in 1935, \$121,000,000.

Steady Expansion

This steady expansion, despite the decrease in the corporate trust, real estate and mortgage fields is concrete evidence that the basic and fundamental business of our trust companies and the foundation upon which they stand is their estates and trusts departments. It is interesting to observe that between the end of 1929 and 1935 the total value of estates, trusts and agencies under administration increased from \$1,628,000,000 to \$2,169,000,000, or an increase of \$541,000,000 during the depth of the depression. Deposits in the guaranteed funds of the various trust companies increased steadily over the same period, and have continued a steady increase since that time. In the case of my own company, the major part of whose business operations are conducted in the Maritime Provinces where there are few millionaires, guaranteed investment deposits have doubled since 1930, having increased from \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000 during that period; while our estates, trusts and agencies under administration have increased from \$43,000,000 to \$49,000,000 during the same period. The sound financial statements presented last year by practically all of the major trust companies, which statements are summarized elsewhere in this issue, speak for themselves of the manner in which our institutions have stood the test of the depression.

Administration of Estates

The practice which has gradually become established of appointing a trust company to act as executor of one's estate, by appointment evidenced in the Will of the testator, or as administrator at the request of the next of kin, or as agent of an executor who may have been named in a Will, but does not wish to act, has not so come about merely by accident, but because business and professional men have come to realize that the trust company makes a business of administering estates whereas the private executor may only act in that capacity once or twice in a lifetime. He knows that the trust company employs expert and trained assistants, offers ample financial responsibility, keeps a proper system of records and accounts, keeps the assets of each estate or trust separate and apart from those of each other estate, and of the company itself, has ample financial responsibility and assured continuity of existence—while last, but not least, it is continuously under government supervision and audit. What private executor can offer these advantages?

35-GALLON RUM SEIZURE MADE BY R. C. M. P.—Seven five-gallon kegs of "new crop" rum were seized by R. C. M. P. last evening in a swamp at Tracadie. The liquor was brought to the city by Constable P. F. Morris who, assisted by special constable R. LeClair, had made the seizure. No arrests were made and police authorities could not say definitely whether court proceedings would be instituted.

TOURISTS MAY BRING DOGS

Prince Edward Island need no longer be known to the tourist as the place "where you can't take your dog." A provincial law prohibiting importation of dogs to the Island during the summer months has been amended by government order in council to allow tourists to bring their dogs here. The canines, however, will have to show a clean bill of health before they will be admitted. The dog prohibition law which was set up a few years ago for the protection of the valuable fox industry has kept a number of canine-accompanied travelers from visiting the Island with a considerable loss of revenue to the province resulting, according to tourist association officials. The amended law provides the deputy provincial secretary with authority to issue permits for the entry of healthy dogs for a three-month period. The visiting dogs will not be allowed to roam at large during their stay here. A few years ago before the ban was established huge losses were suffered by the fox industry when disease believed to have been brought to the Island by an unhealthy dog played havoc with all western ranches and ruined many ranchers.

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Chrysler Officials Visit Here



Three Canadian Chrysler Corporation officials on a goodwill tour of Eastern Canada were in Charlottetown for a short time yesterday. The party included Mr. John D. Mansfield, president of the Chrysler Corporation of Canada, Ltd.; Mr. William E. McGraw, Chief Engineer; and Mr. John H. Hickey, chief service manager, all of Windsor, Ontario. The three company officials were accompanied by Mr. E. J. Hickey, local agent for the Chrysler Corporation.

Mr. Mansfield said, discussing briefly business conditions in Canada, that he saw a general upward trend. So far as his own company was concerned he said that in May this year more business was handled than in any one month in any year since the organization of the company.

The men were pleased with business conditions as they saw them in the province.
