



CANADIAN ATOM REACTOR FOR INDIA

Canadian engineers and physicists are designing and building this atom reactor at Trombay, near Bombay, India. Construction of the building, 135-feet high and 120 feet in diameter, has already been started and when complete it will be similar to the well-known NRX reactor now operating at Chalk River, 120 miles north of Ottawa. It is being built as a joint Canadian-Indian enterprise under the Colombo plan, with Canada paying over \$7,000,000 of the \$14,000,000 cost. Plan To Licence Fishing Masters, Mates Rejected

OTTAWA (CP)—A government proposal to introduce a form of licensing for masters and mates of fishing vessels was rejected Thursday by the Senate transport and communications committee.

The committee voted unanimously to eliminate the proposal from a bill amending a number of sections of the Canada Shipping Act. The bill previously had received approval in principle in the Senate but has not yet been before the Commons.

A section of the bill provides a form of certification for masters and mates of fishing vessels below standards required for operation of vessels carrying freight or passengers.

Deputy transport minister John Baldwin said the department's proposal is to introduce the system gradually by regulation in conjunction with an educational program.

It was not the intention to require masters and mates of fishing vessels to immediately pass examinations of competency.

The committee decided that an extended educational campaign should be conducted before any form of licensing is introduced.

Mr. Baldwin said masters and mates of fishing vessels are not now required to obtain certificates. However, the department felt there should be some form of certification. There had been a recent series of accidents caused by carelessness or lack of knowledge of navigation.

Senator J. J. Kinley (L—Nova Scotia) said the accident record of east coast seamen has been splendid for more than 100 years. He was not against progress but felt masters and mates had not received sufficient notice to prepare themselves for certification.

NO IMMEDIATE NEED

"There is no immediate need for this regulation," he said. "It should be deferred until the fishing industry has a chance to consult with the transport department on anything that should be done."

Senator F. G. Bradley (L—Newfoundland) said most masters and mates knew nothing of "book-learning."

"They know what they are doing because they know the sound of the sea. They can smell the rock," Senator Donald Smith (L—Nova Scotia) said that although the department plans gradual introduction of certification, the amending section does not make this clear. There was no assurance fishermen would not be required to take examinations immediately.

Toronto Employees Threaten Strike

TORONTO (CP)—Six hundred civic employees last night voted to give their union executive power to call a strike if the city board of control does not make them a suitable wage offer.

Members of local 43 of the Municipal Employees' Association also called for a meeting with the Metropolitan Toronto government, which administers certain public services for Toronto and 12 suburban municipalities.

Local 43 represents 2,100 outside workers, including garbage collectors, street cleaners and maintenance men.

The union has asked an eight-per-cent wage increase, free hospital care and four weeks' holiday after 25 years' service.
