

Traffic Congestion Great Waster Of Man Hours

TORONTO (CP)—Traffic congestion in cities is one of the greatest wasters of man-hours and a major impediment both to industry and recreation, says the current commercial letter of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

The time is past, it states, when traffic congestion can be viewed as a minor inconvenience and part of the price to be paid for other conveniences.

The letter, entitled "Let Us Make Our Cities Efficient," presents material prepared by Eric Beecroft, director of the Community Planning Association of Canada, and includes diagrams to show how Edmonton developed its Sherbrooke district. It comments that Edmonton "is becoming widely celebrated for its planned neighborhoods."

"Basic remedies for congestion," says the letter, "are not makeshift control and parking schemes which account for so great a part of the cost of public bodies and of space in the press, but imaginative planning of the entire physical growth of the metropolis—in transport, industry and residential development."

West Germans To Start Army

BONNEN, Germany. (AP)—The first volunteers for the new West Brigades which will be completed by early December. The men returning have completed a two-year tour of duty with Canada's NATO forces in Europe.

German army will put on their uniforms in two weeks, defence ministry officials said Tuesday.

This vanguard of 1,000 officers and men will be the initial installment on the buildup of the 500,000-man armed force to be integrated in the Atlantic alliance.

The day they are called up—perhaps Nov. 15—will mark officially the rebirth of the German army.
