

Pirates Take Twin Bill; Chicago Sox Cop Two

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Roberto Clemente's second home run of the day helped Pittsburgh Pirates to a 5-3 victory in the second game and a sweep of a Memorial Day doubleheader against Chicago Cubs Monday. The Pirates took the opener 5-2.

The Cubs had a 3-1 lead going into the seventh inning of the nightcap, but Jerry May's single, a pinch double by Jim Pagliaroni and an infield out scored one run. Then Clemente tagged a two-run homer.

CHICAGO (AP)—Jack Lamabe allowed only one hit—Joe Foy's single in the eighth inning—as Chicago White Sox collected a double shutout of Boston Red Sox Monday with an 11-0 victory.

John Buzhardt pitched a five-hitter in Chicago's 1-0 opening game victory, gained on Bill Skowron's run-scoring single in the seventh inning.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Bernie Allen smashed a tie-breaking two-run homer in the eighth inning and Harmon Killebrew drove in three runs with two homers as Minnesota Twins defeated Baltimore Orioles 7-4 Monday and gained a split of an American League doubleheader.

The Orioles won the opener 5-1 behind Dave Johnson's four singles and home runs by Woody Held and Andy Etchebarren.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jack Fisher's fine six-inning relief pitching saved New York Mets a split of a doubleheader on a 3-1 victory in the second game Monday after Jim Bunning won his sixth straight for the Phillies 7-2 in the opener.

Richie Allen, Bill White, Bob Uecker and Johnny Callison hit home runs behind Bunning in an 11-hit attack on loser Gordon Richardson and three successors. Bunning's 24-inning shutout string was snapped by the Mets with two runs in the ninth.

ATLANTA (AP)—Don Drysdale scattered nine hits and contributed a double and a single as Los Angeles Dodgers battered Atlanta Braves 10-6 Monday night.

Drysdale allowed three home runs but coasted to his fourth victory against four defeats.

The Dodgers routed Tony Coninger with a four-run third inning that gave Drysdale a big margin.

Maury Wills led off the game with a home run for the Dodgers.

Power Kings Move Into Third

The Power Kings took over sole possession of third place in the C.C.S.L. with a 19-18 decision over City Hall last night. The Bankers are currently tied with the Pistons for second spot. Gordie Bowtle, who was credited the win was relieved by Bill Smith in the 6th. Bowtle is now 1-2. The Yankees won the opener 4-2 before 31,764, the Senators' second largest crowd of the season.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Dennis McLain allowed only one hit as Detroit Tigers downed Kansas City Athletics 5-2 in American League action.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Ray Sa-decki pitched a five-hitter as San Francisco Giants unleashed a 12-hit attack to rout Cincinnati Reds 8-4 Monday night.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Orlando Cepeda pounded his eighth home run, two doubles and a single, as St. Louis Cardinals beat Houston Astros 3-1 behind Bob Gibson's three-hit pitching Monday night in National League action.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Home runs by Jim Fregosi and Bobby Knoop carried California Angels to 4-3 and 5-1 victories over Cleveland Indians Monday.

Fregosi won the opener with a tie-breaking homer in the seventh inning. Knoop decided the nightcap with a two-run homer in the fourth.

British Racer Graham Hill Captures Indianapolis

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Graham Hill a London road racer, scored a disputed victory in the U.S. Memorial Day 500-mile auto classic Monday, a race marred by a massive flaming pileup on the first turn.

Hill, a 36-year-old Briton, appeared to be the first across the finish line, but backers of Scotsman Jim Clark said the scoters erred and the Scot won. Clark, the defending world and Indianapolis champion, appeared to be the No. 2 finisher, but factory representatives backing him said they would protest if the official finish—which isn't posted until today—shows Hill in first place.

Only seven cars were running in a spectacular 16-car pileup shortly after the race began. SPEED SLOWER.

Hill's winning speed of 144.317 miles an hour was far below Clark's 1965 record of 150.688 because the yellow caution light was on for 41 minutes, compared with 12 last year.

The early crash forced a restart of the race for the second time in three years.

Hill enthusiastically bussed the 500 festival queen three times but was more shy with reporters. Asked if he would return for next year's race he said, "I expect so—if I can get a ride."

Jim McElreath of the United States finished third; Gordon Johncock of the U.S. fourth; Mel Kenyon of the U.S. fifth, and Stewart was listed sixth.

The pileup at the start wiped out 11 of the 33 starting cars and sent five others to the pits for repairs and replacement of skid-flattened tires.

Major contenders who didn't complete a lap included two-time winner A. J. Foyt, his second wreck of the month; Dan Gurney, Grand Prix racer, and Don Branson, who finished fourth last year.

FAN INJURED
 Seconds after top-qualifier Mario Andretti's pole car crossed the starting line, a chain reaction collision started. Cars skidded and crashed for 200 yards. Arnie Knepper and Al Miller leaped from burning vehicles and a wall of flames ran across the track. Branson lost two wheels, one of which hit a spectator who was sent to hospital with a back injury. Sixteen other spectators were hit by flying debris, but not seriously hurt.

The cars were running much slower than the speed in the second-lap pileup two years ago, in which drivers Eddie Sachs and Dave MacDonald were killed. A minor leg cut suffered by Foyt was the only injury to a driver in Monday's first lap entanglement.

Driver Don Branson said Foster ran over the back of Johncock, starting the chain-reaction accident which another driver, Arnie Knepper described as "looking like worms crawling through spaghetti."

Hill and Stewart were teammates in English Lola cars with American Ford engines, by John Mecum Jr. of Houston, Texas.
