stration against Texas, during the pendency of negotiations, will be considered as against the United States, and treated accordingly. This is very pleasant while it lasts, as the Scotchman said when midway on his fall from the fourteen story house; but how long it is to last, and what it is to be the result, we are not prepared to predict."

FROM MEXICO.—Later dates from Mexico have been received at New Orleans. A British frigate, name unknown, was lying off Sacrificos on the 8th ult. The French man of war ship Griffon was also there, and three more vessels of the same nation were daily expected. It was supposed that they were concentrating there in anticipation of difficulties that may grow out of the retail trade law.

FRANCE AND THE UNITED STATES. The bold impolitic measures which have lately engrossed the attention of President John Tyler, with reference to the Texas question, appears to have been well received in France by the republican party. These evildoers are of course to be found every where, and the French press seem to think that now is the time in conjunction with the U. States, to make a serious thrust at England. The following is from a Paris paper:—

The recent intelligence from the United States has created a great sensation at Paris. The Annexation of Texas has revived the numerous speculations which were afloat during the Canada affair, of the necessity of making common cause with the United States, and of thus directing a powerful blow against the best interests of Great Britain.

The attitude is already in the field, and calls on the nation to disregard the neutralism of M. Guizot and to think only of the great advantages which a good understanding with the American union must create for France. It says that the Annexation of Texas to the States is a new political combination, weakening the British government, and its aristocracy in the most sensitive point; that our relations with the Cabinet of Washington cannot be friendly; that our Canadian possessions are in danger; and that the European powers, and particularly France, who have tolerated the insulting role of British supremacy, should be prepared to take advantage of the chances which this new combination must ere long afford.

The Colonial Gazette in speaking of the annexation of Texas to the United States, has the following remarks, which we think will possess some truth before the matter is put to rest:—

"It is a disagreeable task—but there is every chance that it will fall to the lot of this country, to chastise the cock-sure spirit of insolent dishonesty which is gaining the ascendant in the North American Union. It will cost us some taxation and suffering; but the Americans are forcing it upon us, and they have yet to learn what Great Britain can do. The boasted business of the ( unjust ) attempt to suppress their independence—the decayed flourish of arms of 1812, have given them a false estimate of their own and British strength. They will come to themselves when the mouths of the Hudson, Chesapeake, and Mississippi are choked."
