THE traffic receipts of the Canadian Pacific Railway, for the week ending November 21st, were \$248,000, an increase of \$92,000 compared with the corresponding week last year. THE traffic returns of the Canadian Pacific Railway last week were \$248,000 against \$186,000 for the corresponding period of last year, showing an increase of \$62,000 for 1886. THE mortality statistics for October show a diminution in eleven cities of 294 deaths as compared with September. There was, however, an increase generally in the number of deaths from diphtheria. An exciting race may be looked for at the Roller Rink, next Wednesday evening, between Messrs. Hunter and Brecken. This will be the last race on rollers before the managers of the Rink cover it with ice. THE next sitting of the County Court of Queen's County will be held at Charlottetown on Tuesday, the 23rd day of December next. The last day for issuing summonses for the said Court, Saturday, 18th December, 1886. WITH reference to the nuisance on Hillsborough Street, complained of by a correspondent in Saturday's issue, we are requested to state that the party responsible for the nuisance was fined \$30 therefor some days ago. It was announced in St. Peter's Church yesterday that the Rev. James Simpson, M. A., late of Trinity College School has been called to the charge of that Church. Mr. Simpson will arrive a few days before Christmas. The steamer M. A. Starr, from Halifax, arrived here at a quarter past twelve yesterday morning, after a very rough passage, with a general cargo of merchandise. She sailed on return at 2 o'clock this afternoon, with a cargo of oats, barley, pork, lobsters, &c. Two valuable collections of the fauna, minerals and birds' eggs of the Hudson's Bay region, made by Mr. F. F. Payne, of the Toronto Meteorological Service, while a member of the Hudson's Bay expedition, have been presented by that gentleman to the Marine Department. THE Montreal Witness remarks that if Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues, who are at present on a stumping tour in Ontario, intend to do the rest of the Dominion as thoroughly as they have done the counties north and west of Toronto, the Dominion elections are not so very near.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Sad Drowning Accident. HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 28. A terrible drowning accident is reported from Hantsport. During Friday's gale the second mate, the steward, and seaman, Orlando Lake and Ernest Lake, left the barkentine Falmouth in a boat from Hantsport. They had not proceeded far when the boat capsized. The two Lakes were drowned. The remaining two fought death face to face, and finally were washed ashore near Newport, but Sanford was so far exhausted that he only lived a few minutes. Sanford was a native of Newport, where he leaves a widow and several small children. The two Lakes were brothers, both single. The second mate soon recovered.

Another Railway Collision.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 28. An engine in charge of Edward Drohan, collided this afternoon with a freight train on the Chicago and Southern Railway. Drohan had with him on the engine his sons, seven and eight years old, also John Mahar, aged five, and seeing the approaching danger, he threw the three children out of the cab window, stayed at his post, and was killed. John Mahar was also killed, and the engineer of the freight train badly injured.

Through the Whirlpool.

NIAGARA FALLS, Nov. 28. George Haselett and Miss Sadie Allen, of Buffalo, went through the rapids and whirlpool this afternoon in the torpedo-shaped barrel used by Haselett and Polts last summer. They were in the rapids and whirlpool five minutes and were taken out of the eddy on the Canadian side half an hour later, in good condition. Miss Allen is a respectable girl, 18 years old and rather pretty.

Plundering the Mails.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 28. Thirty-two sacks, containing mails from England to Germany, Russia and the East, while in transit on the train to Belgium yesterday, were cut open and plundered. Letters from America, containing money and demands to the amount of £40,000 were stolen.

A Disastrous Fire.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 28. This city suffered last night from the most disastrous fire in its history, the loss being about \$855,000, with insurance of \$613,000. Three men were killed, two elevators were destroyed, one of which contained 400,000 bushels.

A Sailor Injured.

HALIFAX, Nov. 28. The barkentine Brazil arrived at Hantsport on Friday night from Boston. While entering the Bay, and while the men were in the act of shortening sail, one man fell from the upper topsail yard, receiving such injuries that he will die.

The Anarchists Again.

PARIS, Nov. 28. While a Radical meeting was being held here to-day, the platform was stoned by a party of Anarchists. A fierce conflict ensued in which the police finally cleared the hall.

A \$150,000 Fire.

BOSTON, Nov. 28. The large establishment of Lockwood Manufacturing Company, East Boston, was burned this morning. Loss, \$200,000; insurance, \$150,000.
