Four Conventions Scheduled In Charlottetown Next Week

Around 150 to 175 delegates will attend the convention of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada at the Charlottetown Hotel Sept. 6 to 8.

Scheduled for the same dates is a convention of the Canadian area Commonwealth Parliamentary Association. Approximately 50 delegates from the provincial and federal government are expected to attend sessions in the P.E.I. Legislative Assembly chambers.

Two other conventions will run Sept. 9 and 10. About 50 mayors from across Canada will attend the fall meeting of the executive council and national advisory board of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities.

About 20 representatives of federal and provincial governments are expected at the Oct. 9 to 10 conference, a federal-provincial conference on the development of historical resources.

The meeting will discuss means of enhancing the tourist industry and making people more aware of their cultural heritage.

P.E.I. United Fund Campaign Opening Sept. 24

The Prince Edward Island United Fund appeal, the third in the history of the province, is slated to start this year on Sept. 24. The campaign will last to Oct. 20.

This year's objective will be announced shortly. The official opening ceremonies will be held on the evening of Sept. 24, when about 3,000 persons are expected to attend dinners at all the regional high schools throughout the province.

In conjunction with the dinners, United Fund President Brigadier W.W. Reid will deliver an address, which will be televised and viewed at all the dinners in the regional high schools.

Last year's United Fund campaign objective was \$238,031. This amount was 5.9 per cent over the amount received in the initial campaign in 1962, when \$219,706.69 was raised.

In 1963 there were 27 participating agencies in the United Fund appeal. One of the agencies which will benefit from the campaign is the Prince County Welfare Agency.

In 1963 the welfare agency saw 23 adoptions completed; 29 boarding home placements awarded; 486 families assisted; and 173 other individuals given help.

Side Man Convicted For Dangerous Driving

Summerside airman Jean Yves Carignan pleaded guilty yesterday to a charge of dangerous driving and was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days. Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C.

Carignan was the driver of a car which crashed near the Trans Canada Highway on the way from Charlottetown to Summerside, killing a woman passenger, Mrs. Lydia Anslow, and injuring two others. A coroner's jury last week failed to find Carignan criminally responsible in the accident, but the Attorney General's department pressed the dangerous driving charges as a result of evidence heard at that time.

Other cases in magistrate's court included an impaired driving charge against W. I. Preston Beaton of Brooklin, who was fined \$100 and costs on 10 days, when he pleaded guilty.

Four Charlottetown youths all charged with break, entry and theft some time ago in connection with the same incident appeared again in court. Melvin Alvin Jackson, Stewart Gayland Ferguson, John Wayne Casford and Richard Derrill Casford were all remanded to Sept. 9.

Donald Louis Breehaut was remanded by consent to Oct. 3 for trial of his escaping from custody charge.

Shawn David Smith of Charlottetown was charged with break, entry and theft in an incident in which \$54 in cash and two cartons of cigarettes were taken from a cottage. The cigarettes and \$34 in cash were recovered by RCMP.

Smith elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to the charges. Magistrate Johnson ordered that restitution of the missing \$20 be made and adjourned the case to Sept. 11 for sentencing. A juvenile apparently admitted investigation of the theft. Smith paid \$10 (half) in restitution.
