HIGH COMMISSIONER WILL CONFER WITH KRUGER.

No Foreigner to be Allowed to Act as Arbitrator.

PRETORIA, Aug. 8.—The despatch of Mr. Chamberlain besides proposing the joint commission of enquiry into the Transvaal Franchise adds that when this matter is settled the High Commissioner will not be unwilling to confer with President Kruger on other questions, including arbitration, provided always that a foreigner is never permitted to act as arbitrator.

Trouble in Austria.

VIENNA, Aug. 5.—The Austrian Government is awake to the fact that the situation throughout Cisleithania is now revolutionary and that disaffection is even extending to the municipal Councils. Minister-President Thun-Hohenstein leaves Saturday for Ischl, where he will have a conference with the Emperor relative to the bone of contention—government by the Crown without the summoning of the Reichsrath.

Passion Play.

Notwithstanding the counter attraction of the concert at the Gardens, the cinematograph reproductions of the Passion play drew a large audience to the Academy last night. A performance of this nature cannot be written of as an ordinary concert or lecture. The pictures represent the world famed Passion play of the Bohemian peasants, and aside from their sacred interest they are of importance because illustrative of people's devotion. The purpose of the pictures is well understood, and nothing need be said of the profound solemnity and significance of the themes treated.

There were given a number of tableaux from the old Testament events—Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden; the temptation and the fall; the manna falling in the desert, and the finding of the child Moses in the bulrushes. Next in the series were shown the angel appearing to Mary and the principal events in the life of the blessed Saviour, from the manger to the cross. In some, hundreds of the peasants were seen portraying the various characters and moving as in life. The closing picture was the ascension.

The pictures were accompanied by an explanatory lecture and several sacred solos. The Passion play will be shown again this evening.—Hx. Herald.

In the evening the members enjoyed one of the rare treats of the session, an evening with the microscope, when D. Bryce Scott, Esq., with his magnificent instruments, both costly and varied, exhibited to the members of the school objects illustrative of animal and inanimate life. Thursday gave a divided school. Part of the school went to Dalhousie, as no boat could be procured with capacity sufficient to carry the entire school. The remainder spent the afternoon in laboratory and field work. The evening's discussion was devoted to the consideration of zoological subjects. Interesting addresses were given by Messrs Oullar and Hickman who dealt principally with the snakes and birds of New Brunswick.

Friday was the gala day of the school. The citizens of Campbellton with characteristic liberality, chartered the steamship Admiral, and took the school for an excursion over Baie des Chaleurs, calling at Dalhousie, N. B., and Carleton, Quebec. The scenery along the banks of the bay is some of the most varied and beautiful that can be seen anywhere. The varied lines of green upon the mountain, the display of light and shade made a picture long to be remembered, and elicited exclamations of surprise and delight. We passed the famous Loch Arran hotel, and had its chequered history related by residents of the country. The hotel is now unoccupied.

Though somewhat tired with the excursion the members turned out in goodly numbers at the evening meeting. The subjects for discussion was the relation of the school to the question of agriculture. Hon. Mr. LaBillois, Commissioner of Agriculture, for N. B., presided. In the course of his opening remarks he indicated what the Government of N. B., had done to secure the teaching of agriculture in the schools. Hon. Mr. Tweedy, Provincial Secretary for New Brunswick, spoke briefly as to the importance of the subject of agriculture and what the schools might accomplish in giving an impetus to the agricultural interests of the provinces. The principal speaker of the evening was Mr. Hubbard, of Sussex, Editor of the Co-operative Farmer. He urged the importance of a scientific education for the farmer. He congratulated the Summer School on the work being accomplished by it and hoped that the attendance would increase year by year and that such institutions would be multiplied in these provinces.

An animate discussion followed the address. Thanks were tendered Messrs. Hubbard, Tweedy and LaBillois and at a late hour the meeting was concluded by the singing of the Summer School Ode.

POLITICS IN SAN DOMINGO

Excitement in the Little Republic.

AN INSURRECTIONARY EXPEDITION IS EXPECTED.

The Troops Called out to Protect the Government.

PUERTO PLATA, San Domingo, Aug. 8.—Senor Alvarez, Minister of Finance, and Senor Cordro, with one hundred men went to Monte Christie, and united with seven hundred men who it is understood had been assembled on behalf of the government for the restoration of order.

Armed steamers are watching the coast to prevent the landing of an insurrectionary expedition, should such a thing be attempted.

The Governor of Monte Christie has three hundred men under arms for the preservation of the palace.

The situation is considered grave.

TERRIFIC CYCLONE

Sweeping Over the West Indian Islands.

KINGSTON, Ja., Aug. 8.—The island of Dominica in the Leeward Islands, reports that a terrific cyclone was sweeping over that island yesterday making towards Jamaica.

The shipping along the threatened area received timely warning.

PROHIBITION MEETING.

Both Governments Denounced By Mr. Duncan Marshall—Prohibitionists Should Vote Them Down.

There was a good attendance at the public meeting in the E. M. C. A. hall last evening. The meeting was in the interests of the prohibition movement, and the chair was occupied by Mr. R. C. Goff.

The meeting was first addressed by Evangelist Whiston, who prefaced his remarks with a vocal solo. Mr. Whiston spoke of Christian citizenship as the greatest moral question, and expressed the opinion that every Christian should be a politician. Christians allowed politics to be controlled by corrupt and selfish men, hence the existing corruption. The Church of Christ held the balance of power, but failed to exercise it. There should be the same standard of morals for men and women. All Christians should stand by their colors and make their influence felt.

The hymn "Onward Christian Soldier" was then sung, after which Mr. Duncan Marshall referred to prohibition as the great question. The way to wipe out the liquor traffic is by prohibitory legislation. The people have voted for prohibition, but the government will not give it to them claiming that the majority was not large enough. Much has been said lately about corruption. But the corruption in the plebeian campaign in Quebec was not equalled by the West Egin, West Huron or Brockville. Mr. Marshall followed up this statement by a short arraignment of the government and its ministers who had gone contrary to the will of the people as expressed at the polls. He pointed out that the clear duty of prohibitionists is to vote down the Federal Government which insulted the intelligence of the people of Canada in regard to the prohibition question and the Provincial Government which had betrayed a cherished principle of the temperance and christian people of Prince Edward Island.
