Two Charges Are Laid Of Leaving Accident

Two persons appeared Saturday before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC, in city police court on charges of leaving the scene of an accident.

William Michael King, Jr., pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days, and William MacPhail, Charlottetown, had his case adjourned to Sept. 11.

A City youth, Gerard MacDonald, 16, charged with theft under \$50, pleaded guilty and was remanded without bail to September 7. The charge involves the theft of a bicycle, property of Shane Foster. The offence involves five others, all juveniles, who are connected with similar charges — which resulted when police recovered two stolen bicycles which were dismantled and from which the serial numbers had been removed, later to be used as spare parts.

Police Chief Stems Webster said "this sort of thing has been going on too long." Last month the department recovered 28 out of 37 bicycles which were reported stolen. Some parts were recovered in a woods near Spring Park School.

The Charlottetown Fire Department answered a call last evening to William A. Cutcliffe's residence at 42 Brighton Road.

Mr. and Mrs. Cutcliffe were forced out of the house shortly after 11 by heavy smoke. When the firemen first arrived they had difficulty locating the fire which was in one of the walls. No estimate of the damage was available, but there was evidence of heavy smoke damage.
