 CANADIAN PRODUCE AGENTS WANTED

What we want is Canadian Produce Agents in Liverpool and London, who will make a speciality of receiving and selling Canadian apples, potatoes, butter, live stock, etc., etc. As it is now, nearly our whole shipments are consigned to Brokers, whose business it is to sell, and who knows nothing about handling a cargo or how it should turn out; or unless shippers accompany their shipments, who as a general rule, are unacquainted with the market and how to dispose of their cargoes in the most profitable manner. The consequence is that the returns realized are not what they should be. To give you an idea of this, let me tell you about one of our shipments of potatoes. We shipped some 2,800 barrels of potatoes. The cargo, by the *Annie Wharton* turned out in splendid order. Now, potatoes, butter and other produce are sold by brokers from samples, as I told you apples were. The broker to whom the cargo was consigned, had 10 barrels of these potatoes taken from the vessel to his sale-rooms as samples. Two of these barrels had been touched with frost. About 10 barrels out of the whole cargo were slightly touched with frost, and out of that 10, two of them happened to be among the 'sample'. The broker did not wait until the vessel discharged, nor did he examine the cargo. The most he could get for the cargo, from that sample, was from £2 to £3 per ton. I arrived just in time to stop the sale. I had the cargo landed, found the potatoes in excellent condition, and the result was that I sold them the 10 barrels for 4s 6d. each; the remainder for from £3 to £7 10s. per ton. Had I not arrived just when I did, the whole cargo would have been sacrificed at £3 or £4—£4 at the highest. Now, I think if there was a Nova Scotia Agency in this city—and a man for the position who understood the business, and in whom our shippers could place confidence, that we could consign our shipments to him, rely on their being properly handled, and realize the highest market prices. I think it would pay a Nova Scotia or I should say, a Canadian Agency—
 Rep.—What kind of potatoes were these?
 Mr. F.—Principally Snow Flakes and Early Rose; raised in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

THE CLIMATE AND LIVERPOOL BROKERS.
 Rep.—How do our potatoes stand the climate over there?
 Mr. F.—Very well as far as my experience goes. We shipped equal to 3,000 barrels in the *Prince Edward* from Charlottetown, and they turned out in first class order. I found the market fully supplied, and I was advised to sell them at £4 10s. per ton. I wanted £3 and determined not to sell for less, notwithstanding that there were a large quantity of Canadian potatoes sold that day for £4 10s. I decided to hold mine over—and I test the climate, if need be. But I had not long to wait. That day I sold 500 barrels at £3 cash, in the face of the brokers' advice. I also intimated that unless they could get £3 for them I would try another broker. That was sufficient; the next day they sold at £3. Had I not been there, those potatoes would have been sacrificed at £4 10s.

Rep.—Do you think it advisable to ship apples and potatoes in the same vessel?
 Mr. F.—No. Neither apples, potatoes nor hay should be shipped in the same vessel, because the hay generates steam; and the gases from apples or potatoes affect either. In shipping potatoes in barrels, the barrels should not be out, but well filled and headed tight.

Rep.—What kind of potatoes is preferred in England?
 Mr. F.—As a rule, I found that white potatoes sell best, because they cook best. Like everything else in England, potatoes are bought on their merits. They are not sold by names, but by their cooking quality, after being tested. There is a prejudice against colored potatoes. 'Chillies' are generally worth less than other potatoes in the English market, but a Cornwallis man sent some across, which, on a sample being cooked, turned out well, and realized £1 per ton more than they usually do.

WILL IT PROVE A PERMANENT MARKET.
 Rep.—Do you think the shipment of potatoes to England will prove a permanent and profitable business.
 Mr. F.—No, I do not. In ordinary seasons the English market averages £3 and £3 10s. per ton. But this season the English crops failed, and prices in Nova Scotia being low, there was in in-

ducement to run a risk in making shipments. But changes may occur; the English crops will likely go up next season, and then it will not pay to run the risk.
