Charlie raced far to his left to scoop up a hot grounder behind second base and throw to first to retire the runner. The ball was hit very hard and all the earmarks of a base hit until Kennedy grabbed it on the dead run, stated MacCormack.

Annual Meeting Of C.A.H.A. Is Concluded

MINNAKI, Ont., June 18 — (CP) — The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association heard today the idea that Canadian hockey tours of Europe create goodwill for the country is "plain bunk."

Doug Grimston of New Westminster, B. C., who completed his two-year term as president of the organization's four-day annual meeting concluded today, "very seriously" all aspects of any proposed tour in the future before making a decision. He attended the Winter Olympic Games in Norway this year as Canada's hockey representative and observer.

Grimston termed the association's meeting highly successful and added that organized hockey in the country should benefit from decisions taken, many of a controversial nature.

Probably the most far-reaching was unanimous agreement from every province represented that the C. A. H. A. negotiating committee meet the N. H. L. relations committee for a general review of their contract that will cover practically all phases of the game.

Delegates expressed dissatisfaction with certain clauses of the agreement, particularly the signing of teen-aged amateurs to professional hockey lists. They felt that the C. A. H. A. should have more say in the operation of organized amateur hockey.

Today's session was devoted to sundry items of business and election of officers. Agreement was reached on most points.

Special permission was given to each team in the Ontario Junior "A" League to dress 18 players next season in league competition only in line with Quebec clubs. For the playoffs, under supervision of the C. A. H. A., the player limit will be 15 a club as stipulated by association rules.

The meeting also okayed a request by Quebec that the winner of the Quebec Major Series next season may meet the winner of the Western Canada Professional League in a special playoff, but only in the event that the Maritimes does not operate a Major Series League in 1952-53.

Delegates from the Maritimes said a decision would be made at a meeting June 29 at New Glasgow, N. S.

Grimston, who bumped into difficulties when Edmonton Mercury's Olympic hockey champions, complained of financial and other arrangements connected with their three-month tour of Europe, said he doubted that Canadian teams created goodwill from European countries.

He produced extracts from some European newspapers which panned the Canadians. One newspaper—the Neue Zürcher Zeitung—of Zurich, Switzerland—described the Canadian and American Olympic players as "rowdies" and recommended that "the pollution of European hockey through overseas teams" be ended.

Ray Robinson In Convincing Fight Workout

POMPTON LAKES, N.J., June 18 — (AP) — Ray Robinson, righthanded pitcher of the New York Giants, today in a convincing workout for Monday's light heavyweight title match with champion Joey Maxim at Yankee Stadium.

"The way I look at it any round could decide it," said Sugar Ray.

"I don't know if I can knock him out. But I'll be hitting at him, trying for a knockout."

Manager George Gairford hinted that Robinson would try to keep both his middleweight title and the light heavy crown if he should beat Maxim.

"If Robinson wins," said Gairford, "no government can take away his title."

Reminded that he made the same claims about the welter crown after Robinson beat Jake LaMotta for the middleweight title, Gairford said he finally had given up the welter championship. "We can't make the weight any more," he said. "But it still is not official."

So if Robinson beats Maxim, you can be sure Gairford will claim all three crowns. Only two men in ring history — Bob Fitzsimmons and Henry Armstrong — ever won three world championships.
